Freight Derailed; Trainman Injured

Rushed to the Charlottetown Hospital following a train derailment at Union Station, medical authorities reported that Trainman Duncan, Hughes, 21, of Morell, had suffered a sprained back and a fractured ankle.

The accident occurred when a four-car extra freight ploughed into an open switch after rounding a bend and was approaching the station. The diesel engine, two filled tank cars and a box car were derailed but all units remained upright. The caboose did not leave the rails.

Hughes was injured when he jumped clear of the engine as it entered the open switch.

An examination of the switch showed it to be tampered with. The lock was broken. Engineer

Alfred Egan, with his vision limited by the sun shining directly down the line, failed to notice the open switch until about a 100 yards distance. He immediately gave warning and applied the brakes.

Other members of the train crew were E. S. Warren, conductor, Victor Bowlan, fireman, and V. J. Curley, trainman.

Union Station is about seven miles from Charlottetown. It is two miles from Royalty Junction. A wrecking crew from Charlottetown was at the scene shortly after 9 a.m. and the line was cleared by 7:30 p.m.

The freight left Charlottetown Thursday morning at 7 o'clock and the derailment occurred about 7:30.

The injured trainman is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Hughes, Morell.

Fish Plant Inspection Slated For Magdalenes

A three-man team from the Department of Fisheries, Charlottetown, left yesterday on a survey mission to the Magdalene Islands.

Headed by H.L. Boyd, (left) bacteriologist, and including H. N. MacMillan, and A.M. Aitken, technicians, the party will check plant water supply and conduct sanitary surveys on plant products.

The survey is in connection with the recently inaugurated federal inspection plan on fresh and frozen filets. Products of plants which meet the required standards carry an approved government label.

There are three plants to be surveyed in the Magdalenes, stated W.A. Murphy, in charge of the fish inspection laboratory in Charlottetown. They are Gordon-Pew Limited, Amherst and Grindstone, and Grindstone Fisheries Limited at Grand Entry.

Mental Retardation Group To Hold National Convention

The Canadian Association for Retarded Children will meet in their second conference on mental retardation and conduct their annual meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel next week.

President L.H. Hall will give his address at the opening session at 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 16, with Mrs. M.J. McGarth presiding as conference chairman.

An education workshop will be chaired by Mrs. H.B.S. DeGroot, education and rehabilitation chairman, at which time three recognized authorities on this phase of association activities will be participants. They will deal with the topics: "What importance should be given to academic training in day schools for the trainable retarded?" and "Should brain injured children have a program apart from children with other types of mental retardation?"

Following luncheon, when the guest speaker will be Ian Campbell, national co-ordinator of Civilian Rehabilitation Branch, Department of Labour, Canada, a research workshop will be chaired by Mrs. J.O. Arrow-smith, medical research and clinical services chairman.

At 5:00 p.m. there will be a Prince Edward Island social hour and buffet supper, followed by a showing of films.

TRAINING METHODS
Tuesday morning's meeting from 9 to 11:15 a.m. will present "Institutions Panorama" by C. J. Bovey, institutions chairman, with a panel discussion by three outstanding authorities. Subjects dealt with will be "Segregation of mental defectives from mentally ill in Canadian mental institutions," "Training of low grade children in ward classes" and "Is there a need for private residences for mentally retarded children?"

Mrs. June Braaten, recreation chairman will chair the discussion on "Recreation for the retarded."

Following luncheon, a publicity and fund raising workshop, dealing with "Canadian retarded children" will be conducted terminating with talks on "Women's auxiliaries and volunteer groups" with Mrs. McGrath presiding. Participants are Mrs. A.J. Selloum, past-president, Metro-nioli-Toronto Women's Auxiliary and the president of the Quebec Association's Women's Auxiliary.

Following the dinner meeting, W.C. Kitchen, vice-president, will be chairman of a "Bull Session" designed to develop problems of local, provincial and national associations. Questions are encouraged from the floor.

ANNUAL MEETING
The annual meeting and election of officers will take place on Friday morning and afternoon. Tours of the city have been arranged from 10 a.m. for those not attending the business session.

At 6 p.m. there will be a prebanquet social hour. The banquet at 7:00, with Dr. J.D. Griffin, general director of the Canadian Mental Health Association as guest speaker will have as Toastmaster, James A. Roberts, Ottawa, former executive vice-president of the C.A.R.C.

Former Ferry Is Now Scow

The old Rocky Point ferry "Fairview" which was purchased some months ago by O'Brien Scrap Metal Company has now been dismantled and stripped of its machinery.

The ship will now be used as a scow to carry a floating pile driver. Mechanics state that the deck of the former ferry is ideal for this purpose. It has been reported that a test load of 20 tons has been placed to one side of the deck without any noticeable list in the ship.
