

Yankees Trounce Senators Braves Beaten By Chicago

Andy Carey, never regarded as a power hitter, Friday became the fifth major league player to knock a home run into the left-field bleachers at Yankee Stadium.

The Yankees, taking their cue from their second-inning, two-run swat, ended their hitting slump by hammering out 13 safeties and an 8-1 decision over Washington Senators.

Chuck Stobbs was the victim of Carey's 430-foot blow as he suffered his ninth defeat without a win.

In the only other day game, two rookies, bonus pitcher Moe Drabowsky and outfielder Frank Egnaza teamed up to lead Chicago Cubs to a 3-1 win over Milwaukee Braves in the National League.

PROMISING DEBUT

Drabowsky went the distance, giving up nine hits. The 26-year-old Egnaza, making his major league debut, became the 27th player in modern baseball history to homer in his first run at bat. He also tripped.

The loser was veteran Warren Spahn.

The only other batters ever to match Carey's New York blast were Jimmy Foxx, Hank Greenberg, Joe DiMaggio and Gus Zernial.

Elston Howard was catching for the Yankees because Yogi Berra hurt a foot when he was hit by a foul ball in Thursday night's exhibition game.

Tom Sturdivant won with a four-hit pitching job. He was deprived of a shutout when Mickey Mantle lost Jim Lemon's drive in the sun in the second inning. It went for a triple and brought in Herb Pless, who had walked.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Cleveland Indians came from behind to win 4-3 Friday night and stop the Chicago White Sox victory string at nine games. Three singles off three different Chicago relief pitchers in the seventh inning got the Tribe its tying and winning runs.

The Indians and White Sox now each have won nine of their last 12 games, and Chicago holds a two-game edge on the second-place Tribe.

The White Sox got only four hits off starter Bob Lemon, who pulled a thigh muscle in the seventh inning, and relievers Dick Tomaneck and Ray Narleski. Tomaneck was credited with the triumph.

Al Smith singled with one out to start the Indians' game-winning rally. Bob Avila's walk brought Paul LaPalma in to replace rookie Bill Fischer, and Vic Wertz singled to score Smith and tie the score at 3-3. Rocky Colavito greeted the new White Sox pitcher, Gerald Staley, with a single that scored Avila. Fischer was charged with the loss.

BALTIMORE (AP)—Ted Williams, boasting his lofty batting average 13 points, set up the tying run Friday night as the Boston Red Sox surged from behind for a 4-3 victory over the Baltimore Orioles.

The "splendid splinter" had a double and two singles in four "at bats" to increase his .404 average.

to 4-7. With the Sox trailing 3-2, Williams doubled off the right field wall to open the eighth.

After Jackie Jensen walked, Baltimore starter Bill Wright was lifted for Art Houtteman and Jim Linn retired in favor of pinch runner Tom Brewer. Brewer was forced at third on Dick Gernert's sacrifice attempt, but Frank Malone followed with a single which scored Jensen with the tying run.

Neither starting pitcher was around at the finish. Boston's Frank Sullivan was lifted for a pinchhitter in the seventh with the Orioles ahead 3-2. Ike Delock finished up and was credited with the victory, his second compared to two losses.

The world's record for a dead heat pacer on a mile track is 1:59.45 made at Ingewood, Calif. by Ensing Handover (Schue) and Meadow God (Stone) in 1954. Incidentally, Adios Harry holds the world's record of 1:55 made at Vernon Downs in 1955 and his total earnings up to the end of 1956 were \$281,825 and he is only six years old—some pacer!

British racing fans bet \$71,770,305 through the totalizers in 1956. This is only a fraction of the betting that is done on the banglades in the Old Country. Most of the wagers is done through legalized bookmakers. McGinnis KO's Roberts Tiger Defeated Again

A large crowd of spectators witnessed one of the best fight cards that has been presented at the Arena for some time last night with the evening coming to a climax when Jimmy McGinnis' second round knockout over Johnny Roberts of New York.

In other bouts presented on this fine card, Roy Diamond of Charlottetown pounded out an unanimous decision over young Preston Wotton, also from Charlottetown, Leo Steele and Bob Downey in a four round draw and Bernie Stone of Halifax slugged Roy "Tiger" Steele around the ring and by doing so earned himself a unanimous verdict over the winner from Charlottetown.

In the first bout of the evening which was between Preston Wotton and Roy Diamond, Roy swarmed all over Wotton, who was no match for the "Kid", and as early as the first round Wotton was in trouble. The first round opened rather slow but caught fire near the end with Diamond forcing the fight all the way. Wotton's nose which was to bother him through the rest of the fight, began to bleed in the early moments when Wotton fought off Diamond's forward attack and held on, until the bell. The second round opened at a faster pace, but not many hard blows were landed during the round, in the third, Diamond landed a hard right

to Wotton's jaw that hurt the youngster, and caused his nose to bleed again. Diamond got the best of the last round by keeping up a continuous barrage of punches and forcing Wotton to the ropes on many occasions.

The fight between Leo Steele, brother of "Tiger Steele", and Bobby Downey, a young colored boy from Halifax, was a thriller all the way with plenty of exciting and exciting action. Downey's nose started to bleed slightly in the first round but he paid it no heed and continued to box in his fast manner. In the second Steele slipped to the floor and hurt his knee, which caused the fight to be stopped for about two minutes. 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Will Canada Re-enter In The Hockey Championship?

At least three subjects are expected to prompt lively discussion at the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association annual meeting opening here today.

Canada's re-entry in the world hockey championship, the Manitoba and Ontario hockey body's relationship with professional hockey and the agenda of the four-day session.

Between 45 and 50 delegates are to attend, representing amateur hockey groups across the country. Also on hand will be President T. F. Lockhart of the United States Amateur Hockey Association, and two representatives of the National Skating Union of Japan, the latter to discuss with the CAHA possibilities of Canadian teams making tours of their country in 1958 and 1959.

EXPECT WHITBY BID

Closed committee meetings will be held today to set up the agenda for general sessions starting Sunday.

Canada's participation in world hockey competition has been a sore subject since the Canadian team lost to Russia in the 1956 Olympics. Canada did not take part in the 1957 world meet at Moscow.

Whitby Dunlops from Ontario, Allan Cup champions, will press a bid at the meeting here to represent Canada in 1958.

One motion on the agenda says Canada should be represented at the world and Olympic meets only if the teams can be sent with no expense to the CAHA.

Several resolutions have been submitted in connection with the junior picture, which became a hot subject this month following the West's first Memorial Cup victory in 10 years.

HITS AT CANADIENS

One motion submitted by the Manitoba Amateur Hockey Association could hit straight at clubs like Ottawa Canadiens, the eastern junior champions who lost in seven games to Flin Flon Bombers in the Memorial Cup final.

It asks that the resolutions committee consider plans to permit all branch champions to participate in the Allan or Memorial Cup playoffs on even terms and that, if necessary, "the amateur rule be revised to prevent out-and-out professional teams from participating." It adds that "backed teams should be discouraged."

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Target Rocket Misses Range

GLENBORO, Man. (CP)—A target rocket carried by a navy plane missed a firing range near this southern Manitoba town Thursday and exploded in a farm yard, shattering barn windows and injuring a horse.

Farmer Don Rogers, digging a well in the yard, escaped injury. An RCMP spokesman said the incident is being investigated.

The rocket contained six pounds of TNT and gouged a big hole in the farm yard.

"It was just one of those things," Mr. Rogers said. "We've never had any trouble from planes or rockets before."

The spokesman said the mis-fired rocket came from a Royal Canadian Navy Banshee jet plane from the joint air training centre at Rivers, Man., 20 miles northwest of Brandon. It was taking part in a firing exercise at the firing range on the Shilo military camp north of Glenboro, which is 30 miles southeast of Brandon.

100 New Firms Join APEC

HALIFAX (CP)—Executive Manager Nelson Mann said Friday the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council has enrolled 100 new firms and individuals since a membership drive began several weeks ago.

Present membership is just over the 400 mark he said and the campaign will be stepped up in the next few weeks. Officials expect to double the membership by September.
