Body Of Airman Arriving Tonight At Summerside

—The remains of Corporal Joseph Donald Gallant, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cyrus P. Gallant, Wellington, who was killed in the crash of a Lancaster bomber missing since February 1st will arrive at Summerside this evening and will be taken to the Compton Funeral Home from where they will be transferred to the home of his parents for funeral on Monday morning at 9:00 o'clock to Egmont Bay Church and cemetery.

The Lancaster bomber in which Corporal Gallant lost his life had been based at Greenwood, N. S., and disappeared on Feb. 1st while on search for a United States civilian plane. An intensive search at the time by more than 35 planes failed to find the missing bomber and it was not until June 22nd that an airlines pilot, flying to Goose Bay, spotted the crash scene about one hundred miles south east of Goose Bay, Labrador.

Six Prisoners Plead Guilty To Jail Breaking

—In Supreme Court at Summerside yesterday, presided over by Mrs. Justice George J. Tweedy, a Grand Jury returned six bills on indictments against six prisoners charged with escape from Prince County Jail.

All six, on arraignment, pleaded guilty and will be sentenced when court convenes again on Friday, July 3, at 11:00 A. M.

Three of the prisoners, Joseph Arthur Cannon, of Duvar, and Joseph Carl Enzar Perry and Frederick Charles Peters of Summerside, were charged with escape with violence.

Gerald and Claude McKenna, of Bloomfield, and John Arthur Gallant, Summerside, were charged with escape, a lesser charge, as no violence was involved.

In the case of the first three, where the charges were of a more serious nature, the crown did not consent to a speedy trial.

The latter three had the option of a speedy trial in judges criminal court or trial by jury.

They appeared before Judge L. G. Lewis and elected trial by jury.

On being arraigned before Mrs. Justice Tweedy, each of the three pleaded guilty.
