Sets Tone Of Urgency In Energy Probe

CALGARY (CP)—A tone of urgency was set by Premier Manning of Alberta Monday at the opening session of the Borden commission on energy.

Delivering a government statement before the commission hearing briefs on Canada's oil and natural gas situation, the premier said a definite national policy on domestic and export markets for oil and gas is "of utmost importance and a matter of urgency."

The commission, headed by Henry Borden of Toronto, is investigating Canada's energy needs and has been instructed to make export recommendations, particularly as they affect Trans-Canada Pipe Lines Limited which is seeking to export gas from Alberta to the midwest United States.

Mr. Manning said Alberta's oil and gas industries are faced with a serious situation. The current rate of oil production is less than 45 per cent of permissible production "due entirely to lack of adequate markets."

Expect U. S., Russia To Agree On Exchange Visits

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States and Russia are expected to announce today a wide range of agreements on exchanging visits by scientists, writers and artists.

But absent from the agreement, it is understood, will be what was the No. 1 U.S. goal: A swap of uncensored radio-television commentaries on world events.

This idea apparently was relegated to things desirable but left undone. The U.S. hope seemed to be to keep the idea alive for later fulfillment.

Today's agreement, if announced as expected, will climax secret talks going on here since Oct. 28.

It will be the parting shot of Soviet Ambassador Georgi Zorubin. He is going home for re-assignment Jan. 29 after more than five years in Washington.

Zorubin has been meeting for nearly three months at the state department with the chief U.S. negotiator, William S. B. Lacy.

Two reasons seemed to lie behind the shelving of the U.S. TV-radio proposal: Pointed lack of Soviet interest and inability to guarantee that Soviet radio-television broadcasts would get nationwide distribution in the

United States.

The state department appeared to feel it couldn't commit the privately-owned networks to such a program.

A U.S. demand that Russia quit jamming U.S. broadcasts in Russian to the Soviet Union also is understood to have been ditched.

It was reported a majority of the proposals for stepped-up exchanges of delegations and individuals were accepted in principle. Details will be worked out later, presumably in meetings between state department officials and the Soviet Embassy.

One such agreement was reported to be concerned with feature-length movies. This would mean more U.S. movie houses would show Soviet films and Soviet moviegoers would see newer U.S. films.

Most American films now being shown in Russia are beginning to show their age. Tarzan, for example, is a great favorite.

Both sides were said to be eager to carry out their agreement promptly. The principle of reciprocity would be followed—for example, for every delegation of Soviet cattle experts visiting the United States a similar American group would tour Russia.

Violations of the law, said the letter issued from here, include selling liquor on Sunday, selling liquor after hours, selling liquor to juveniles and operating unlicensed establishments.

The liquor law stipulated that only beer or wine could be served with meals Sunday between 1 p.m. and 9 p.m., to travellers. But clubs, grills and hotels in localities large and small were filled Sundays to overflowing.

There was no question of meals being served. Sunday had become the day when people, young and old, drank the most.

Juveniles were served without question and closing hours fixed by the law were ignored. Some establishments served liquor until dawn.

"When the law is constantly violated without reprisals, that is a great weakness," said the letter. "But when the law is violated in the sight of and with the knowledge of everyone, that is a scandal, a blow to morality and an unqualifiable complicity."

The letter said if liquor laws are enforced consumption will drop and many evils will automatically disappear.

Their appeal followed a New Year's message in which Paul-Emile Cardinal Leger, archbishop of Montreal, denounced widespread drinking.

"Opening of a cabaret or a grill or any other liquor outlet in Montreal diocese is done against our will," said Cardinal Leger. He de-

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Quebec Roman Catholics Ask Enforcement Of Liquor Laws

SHERBROOKE, Que. (CP)—The spiritual leaders of Roman Catholics in Quebec's Eastern Townships have appealed for rigid enforcement of liquor laws to put an end to what they described as "scandalous" violations.

Violations, they said, have reached a point where Sunday has been turned from the Lord's day into a day of sin for many.

The appeal was made by Archbishop Georges Cabana of Sherbrooke, Bishop Arthur Duval of St. Hyacinthe and Bishop Albertus Martin of Nicolet. It was contained in a letter sent recently to clergy with a request that it be read from the pulpit as part of a campaign to encourage temperance.

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
