A PRE-DEATH BURIAL

THE FEAR OF IT NOT SO UNREASONABLE AS IS SUPPOSED.

Horrible Discoveries Made in Graveyards in Ancient and Modern Times—Some Precautions Which Should be Taken to Prevent Burial Before Death.

Many who are not at all afraid to die are afraid of being buried before they have died. The fear is not unreasonable. Premature burial happens very rarely, but often enough to call for more precaution.

In British journals this has recently been much discussed, showing no small unbelief in the public mind. There was need of it. In 1841 a law was passed in requiring proof of death before burial. Hundreds of burials take place every year without certificates of death.

The gruesome fact is that it has always been an ancient writer refers to it. Pliny has a chapter on those who have revived on being carried forth for burial. Lord Bacon records that there have been very many cases. Bruhier, a French writer in the last century, produced a book on the subject. It mentioned fifty-four cases of persons buried alive. Fifty-three of these were proved to be impostors.

The danger of premature burial arises from that semblance of death which is produced by medical accidents, or comatose states, or more frequent than now, it occasionally resulted in the rescue from the grave of those that were still alive. Old cemeteries are sometimes removed, and more frequently individual graves are opened for the removal of remains. Then is a distressing fact of a premature burial, which is occasionally revealed. It is stated that in New York six cases in a thousand have occurred.

In Holland the percentage is five in a thousand. Perhaps the most famous case of the last place where one might expect to find the living among the dead, after the corpse has been examined and the official certificate given, even though in one in three hundred has come to life again. A recently published work, by Dr. P. Hartmann, strongly advocates the detection of impostors in the grave, some who have not really died. He has collected over seven hundred authenticated instances. Of these he describes one, even though eight of typical cases, under the title, "Buried Alive."
