Circulation Of Daily Papers Hits Record High

VANCOUVER, (CP) — Total circulation of Canadian Daily Newspapers has reached a record high of more than 3,350,000. Ian H. Macdonald, general manager of the Canadian Daily Newspaper Publishers' Association, reported here Wednesday.

Mr. Macdonald, here for the association's fall directors' meeting today and Friday, said daily newspapers have reached record circulation levels despite competition from television, radio, magazine and week-end publications.

In addition newspapers are enjoying a record dollar volume of national advertising "in spite of increased competition from these other media."

"There is every indication that when the new audit circulation figures are published . . . daily newspaper circulation will be well in excess of 3,800,000," Mr. Macdonald said.

Advertisers at both the manufacturing and retail levels are becoming more analytical and selective in their choice of advertising media as business competition steadily increases.

Daily newspapers welcome this condition "as no other medium is closer to the man who buys and the man who sells."

Met to Discuss Use Of Atom For Electric Power

OTTAWA, (CP) — Atomic energy officials of Canada and the United Kingdom met yesterday at the atomic energy research establishment at Harwell, Eng., to exchange latest technical information on harnessing the atom to produce electrical power.

Similar conferences were held last October at the atomic energy plant at Chalk River, Ont., and at the Harwell establishment in 1952.

The Canadian delegation is headed by W. J. Bennett, president of Atomic Energy of Canada Limited, which operates the Chalk River project, and Dr. W. B. Lewis, vice-president in charge of research at Chalk River.
