

# Rovers In 3-2 Victory Over Anchors Yesterday In City Baseball League

Tom MacFarlane's North-end Rovers won their second straight game of the season yesterday afternoon when they eked out a close 3-2 win over the west-end Anchors in a regular City League fixture at Memorial Field diamond before a good sized crowd of fans.

Coming from behind a two run Anchor lead, built up by a long single by playing manager Johnny Stanley, the Rovers tied things up in the last of the third and went on to win the game from sorrel-tatched Merlin MacKenzie in their half of the fifth frame. The winning run was of the unearned variety as three errors paved the way for the marker.

Donnie MacLean and MacKenzie hooked up in a pitcher's duel with MacLean retiring in the top half of the ninth inning in favor of Benny Carson. MacLean allowed three hits but walked four and whiffed eight. Carson in his one inning stint on the mound walked one batter and struck-out another. MacKenzie was touched for six hits, all singles, while he walked seven and sent seven others back to the dugout waving their bats.

The opening bit of scoring came in the top half of the second frame when MacLean walked Elmer MacNeill to start the inning and Flynn followed with a base hit. MacKenzie fled out to left and Ryan advanced both runners with an infield out. Manager Stanley then promptly singled both runners home with his long single to centre.

The Rovers fought back in their half of the third when with two out Cairns singled. MacLean was safe on Pineau's error. Murphy then singled home Cairns with MacLean going to third and Murphy taking second on the throw in from centre. Perry walked to load the bases and then MacKenzie heaved one by Maurice Flynn to allow MacLean to score standing up with the tying marker. Kennedy walked to keep the sacks crammed full of runners but Harold Hennessey grounded out to MacKenzie to end the inning.

The winning run followed in the fifth frame. With two out Perry's roller went through Willis Hennessey's legs. Kennedy was safe at first on Stanley's miscue. Flynn allowed a pitched ball to get by him and both runners advanced a base. On the next pitch Perry crossed the plate on Flynn's error with Kennedy going to third. Hennessey and Williams walked but Hood fled to centre to end the inning and the scoring for the game.

The leading hitters for the game were manager Stanley of the losers and centre-fielder Cleo Gillis of the Rovers who each had two hits. Stanley was the outstanding fielding star of the game although he committed one miscue afield. Willis Hennessey and Charlie Ryan of the Anchors supplied the fielding gems of the game when both made difficult plays to retire batters.

## Nova Scotia Rifle Team Wins Historic Rifle Shoot At Sussex On Saturday

SUSSEX, N. B., June 17 (CP) — A 16-year-old school girl, first of her sex to compete in the historic inter-Maritime rifle shoot, inspired the Nova Scotian team to victory Saturday in the annual classic.

Elsie Strong, a blonde from Windsor, turned in a score of 101 and until her last three shots threatened to take top honors, won finally by a team mate, Lt.-Col. E. C. Cowan, with 103.

Tied for second place, with scores of 102, were Capt. J. D. Cameron of Nova Scotia, Lieut. P. T. Hooper of Prince Edward Island and Arnold Parks (Saint John) of New Brunswick.

Nova Scotia had 796 of a possible 840—third highest in the history of the shoot and the best ever for a team from that Province. Prince Edward Island, holder of the championship trophy for the past four years, finished with 781 and New Brunswick scored 773.

Captains of the three teams agreed the Miss Strong should be allowed to compete. Only once before, in 1934, had a Provincial team faced the problem of deciding about including a woman, and New Brunswick decided not to enter Mrs. J. Neal Dow, although she had shot well enough to qualify. Mrs. Dow also lives in Windsor. Her husband, Lt.-Col. J. Neal Dow, equalled Miss Strong's score of 101 Saturday.

Shooting side by side with her father, Miss Strong ignored the rain and wind for a perfect 35 at 200 yards. She blasted six straight shots into the bull at 500 yards, then slipped to an inner for a 34. At 600 yards, Miss Strong fired her first four shots into the vital black centre of the target. Her father's fifth shot was a magpie, worth three. Whether it was power of suggestion or a strong gust of wind carried her shot to the right, Miss Strong followed with a magpie on her fifth shot. Another bull and an inner followed, but the fifth shot had spoiled her chance of finishing as top individual.

Col. Cowan turned in possibles at 260 and 500 yards and a 33 at 600 to make up his total.

The Nova Scotians never were seriously threatened, finishing ahead at each stage and winning two of them—at 200 and 600 yards—outright. Their 260 at 500 yards was equalled by Prince Edward Island but the Islanders had finished the 200-yard shooting Rochester with 237 as against 270 for Nova Scotia. At 600 yards, Nova Scotia recorded 257 to 255 for the Island. New Brunswick, second with 265 at 200, slumped out of the picture.

Nearly 10,000 fans watched the fight.

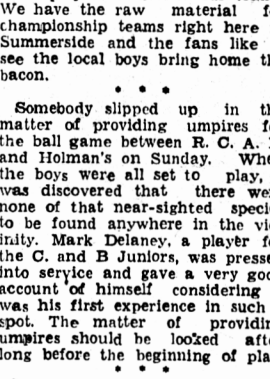
## Attended Adult Education Meeting

## Seven Team Maritime Hockey League Formed

AMHERST, N.S., June 17 (CP) — Seven Maritime hockey teams, members of two leagues who have been bitter rivals since the sport was revived in the Maritimes after World War Two, joined forces here today to form the Maritime Major Hockey League.

The teams who will form the league, provided they post bonds of \$1,000 by June 30, are Glace Bay, North Sydney and Sydney of the Cape Breton major loop, and Halifax, Charlottetown, Saint John and Moncton, of the Maritime major league.

The controversial question of merging the two loops has been the subject of spirited verbal battle for many months.

The delegates, however, decided not to elect officers until a reasonable "waiting period" had passed. They will meet again in Charlottetown July 7.

The decision to form one league did not come without fireworks. The meeting opened with a "suggestion" that the Cape Breton clubs be admitted to the Big Four League. The suggestion brought the Cape Bretoners to their feet in protest, and C. Roy MacDonald, Sydney, president of the Cape Breton League, said his teams were not interested in "being admitted to a Big Four loop" and that they came with the intention of forming "a new league."

Jimmie Macdonald, representing Halifax St. Mary's, and Dr. F. C. Dougan, of Charlottetown Islanders, agreed that the only possible course if hockey were to continue in the Maritimes, would be the formation of a new league.

The seven clubs later approved a tentative schedule which would open Oct. 22 and run 18 weeks. Each club would have two home games per week.

## Lund-Irving Bout Here Tomorrow

Bud Lund, Island lightweight titleholder will meet Crosby Irving of Saint John in a six round bout on Tuesday night's fight card at the Forum. It was announced yesterday by Forum Manager Bill Brown.

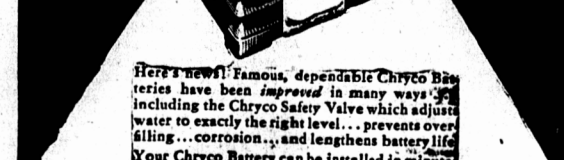
