## Lamb And Wool Support Prices Are Unchanged

OTTAWA (CP)—Federal support prices for lamb and wool in the current fiscal year will remain unchanged, the agricultural stabilization board announced here.

Lamb will be supported at \$18.80 a hundredweight for choice and good grades in the 36- to 56-pound carcass weight range. The wool support price stays at 60 cents a pound.

National average lamb price in the 1964-65 fiscal year was \$21.28 a hundredweight making a deficiency payment unnecessary.

However the wool price fell 12.3 cents below the support last year and 27,000 producers shared a deficiency payment of \$550,000.
