### BEAUTIFUL MAGIC LAKE.

The Present Which an Earthquake Made to Tennessee.

Reelfoot lake, which lies mostly in Obion county and partly in Lake, is the largest sheet of water in Tennessee, it being 40 miles in length and from 3 to 5 in width.

This lake, which evokes rapturous comments from even the most indifferent observer, was formed in a few minutes by an earthquake, which, according to the best authorities, occurred between 2 and 3 o'clock on Saturday morning, Nov. 16, 1811. There were two terrific shocks about 30 minutes apart and many lighter ones between and after. The earth rocked violently, a deafening noise like thunder struck terror to the ear, the atmosphere was heavily laden with something like smoke and vivid and almost constant flashes of lightning illuminated the surrounding country, and in less time than it takes to write it thousands of acres of land had sunk far below the level of the mighty Mississippi.

The Father of Waters rushed into the sunken country, and the suction was so great that for three hours the river ran up stream, and rafts and boats below the lake were torn from their moorings and went whirling into the seething, maddening vortex. As soon as the newly formed lake was filled the river went majestically on its usual course, leaving to Tennessee one of the finest fishing resorts in the country, which is annually the Mecca of thousands of sportsmen.—Cincinnati Commercial Tribune.

#### The Art of Lighting a Pipe.

Now, comrades, not to waste time talking of style of pipe or brands of tobacco—tastes differ in those things—try this: Keep pipe and stem as clean as possible, and the time to clean them is immediately after a smoke. Fill the bowl with your favorite brand and press down firmly, but don't strive to see how solid you can pack it. If you make it as solid as wood, it will burn like wood and make a coal fire about as hot and ungrateful. Don't light the entire surface. Don't "pull" as though you had no more matches and feared it would "go out." Light a small spot directly in the center. Smoke slowly until it works its way gradually downward. If it undertakes to spread, press it down again with thumb or finger. A half minute's care in starting is all that is required. Now smoke slowly. The little fire continues downward, delicately roasting the tobacco on the sides, and presently when you have this off, there will come a revolution in soft, mellow smoke, so cool, so delicious, so soothing, that you will never regret having read this.—Sports Afield.

#### Von.

In Germany "von" implies nobility and all persons who belong to the nobility prefix "von" to their names without any exception. Persons who do not belong to the nobility cannot have the right to put "von" before their names. A man who is knighted for some reason however, has the same right to put "von" before his family name as a person of ancient nobility. #### Homes of the Anthracite Miners.

A group of papers dealing with the Pennsylvania coal regions appears in The Century. Jay Hambidge gives "An Artist's Impression of the Colliery Region." Mr. Hambidge says of one of the "patches" where the miners live: Each little house, with the boxes, cubby holes and fences about it, has been built by the man who lives in it. And he is a laborer, a struggler for mere existence, not deft in the use of tools, nor with an eye for the symmetrical, nor with an appreciation for anything beyond the most primal facts of living. The roofs of the buildings slant at all angles, with no two sides of the same length or deflection. One portion will have eaves, while its companion will scorn the luxury. The same incongruity prevails everywhere. Some of the small openings used for windows are high, while others are low. One door will open in and another out. The hinges have evidently come from the company scrap pile, and the staples and latches and locks from the same source. Some of the roofs have shingles, others weatherboards, while others are formed of great pieces of rusty sheet iron.

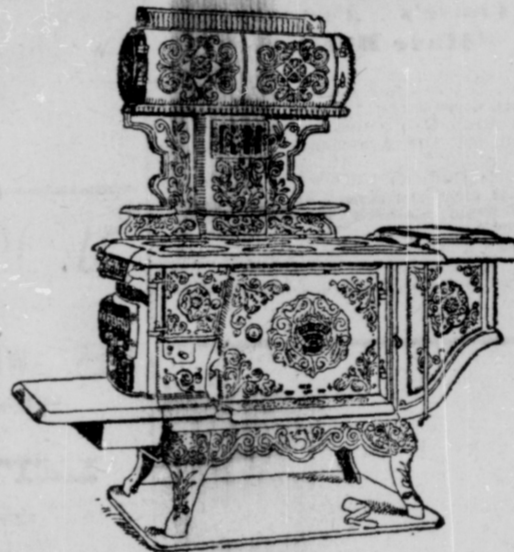
