Egypt and Abyssinia have resumed hostilities.

The Times thinks there is not much reason to doubt that Congress could be easily prevailed upon to accept a treaty of this kind, if it were once put in shape for ratification, the Pennsylvania coal monopolists and a few narrow-headed pine-land owners would of course make strenuous opposition to it.

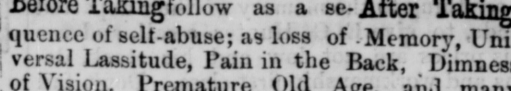
