

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

AFGHANISTAN.

LONDON, Sept. 13.

Generals Stewart and Roberts have received the Grand Cross of the Order of the Bath. Gen. Roberts will take command of the army in the Madras Presidency. The belief that the evacuation of Candahar would be the abandonment of all the fruits of the war has now become almost universal in India.

CALCUTTA, Sept. 13.

Gen. Sir Edwin B. Johnson has resigned his position as a military member of the Supreme Council of India, because of the intimation that he had incurred the censure of Her Majesty's Government in connection with the late failure of the war estimates. General Donald Stewart will succeed him.

During the week the crop prospects in the Punjab, Northwest Provinces and elsewhere have much improved.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Sept. 13.

The brig Curaco, from Curaco, reports that on Aug. 29th, in lat. 27 25, lon. 69 54, fell in with the brig S. A. Snow, from Bridgewater, N. S., for Havana, dismasted, full of water and sinking. Took off the captain and seven men and brought them here. The S. A. Snow was wrecked in a hurricane on August 26th, 128 miles south-east of Bermuda. She was 209 tons and owned at Liverpool, N. S.

The statement of O. P. Silvio about the City of Vera Cruz disaster says that Capt. Van Sice was cool and courageous throughout and there is no reason to believe that he did not remain at his post until taken off by a superhuman agency.

FLORENCE, Sept. 13.

The grand military review on Sunday was a great success. There were thirty thousand troops on the ground and maneuvered splendidly. The King was everywhere greeted with the greatest affection and enthusiasm.

PERA, Sept. 13.

A collective note on reforms in Armenia was presented to the Porte on Saturday. It searchingly criticizes the Turkish note on the same subject, declares that the reforms therein promised are inadequate, warns the Porte against seeking an excuse for delay, and demands the decentralization and restoration of order.

LONDON, Sept. 13.

It is understood that Dean Stanley will pay a final visit in 1881 to the United States, in company with Thomas Hughes. His visit will be of a special character, for the purpose of investigating church questions in the United States.

MADRID, Sept. 13.

The Queen and Princess are progressing favorably.

ACCRINGTON, Eng., Sept. 13.

The weavers held an enthusiastic meeting to-night and decided to strike. They will be supported by a levy of two-pence per loom throughout the northeast of Lancashire.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 13.

Symptoms of Siberia Plague have appeared among the people of a village near Odessa.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.

Ida Townsend, while amusing herself at West Brighton Beach, Coney Island, on Sunday, and showing to what great height she could be swung, was dashed to the ground from a distance of thirty feet. It was found that her spine was fractured and her lower limbs paralyzed.

OWENTOWN, Ky., Sept. 13.

At a picnic twelve miles from here on Saturday a difficulty arose between some drunken boys, which involved three brothers named Smith and three brothers named Hammond, and a half brother of Hammonds named Barnard. Acree Smiths party proved the more expert with weapons. Acree, a boy of eighteen years, is killed, and the Hammonds are all wounded—two mortally. The Smiths and the Hammonds are cousins. The parties who did the shooting avoided arrest. They are sons of G. W. Smith, a justice of the peace and a respectable citizen.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.

Charles D. Gambrell, of the well-known firm of architects, Gambrell & Ticken, shot himself through the head this afternoon in his office. Overwork and consequent nervousness, producing temporary insanity, are given as the cause for the suicide.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.

A telegram received at Interior Department from Indian Agent Page, dated Southern Ute agency, Sept. 6th, says:—"Ouray's death does not effect pending negotiations. One hundred and fifty-six Advat male Southern Utes have signed treaty since his death and more will sign."

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 13.

J. M. Killoch, charged with killing Charles DeYoung, to-day before Superior Court pleaded "once in jeopardy." The plea was entered on the ground that an information charging defendant with murder was set aside in May last.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 13.

This morning Presidential party had their photographs taken. This evening they went to the Bush street theatre, where the "Royal Middy" was presented. Tomorrow the various public institutions will be visited. On Wednesday and Thursday the party will visit Monterey. The President has accepted the invitation of Governor Perry to visit Washington Territory.

BOSTON, Sept. 13.

The election in Maine to-day was very close and the result is doubtful. So far as election for Governor is concerned, 182 towns give Davis (Rep.) 1,599 majority,

against 1,899 last year. Fusionists will elect representatives to Congress in the fourth and fifth and in the first districts.

CALAIS, Me., Sept. 13.

Twenty three towns of Washington county give Davis 3,486 and Plaided 2,745. In same towns last year Davis had 718 majority. Full returns will show little difference from last year. Republicans elect perhaps seven representatives to the Legislature in the county.

PORTLAND, Sept. 13.

Two hundred and seven towns give Davis (Republican) 43,477; Plaided, (Democrat) 41,837; scattering, 220; total, 85,524. Same towns last year gave Davis 41,393; Smith, 26,890; Gracelon, 12,803; scattering, 161; total, 81,248—Davis' majority 1,420, against 1,540 in same towns. Last year towns to hear from gave Davis 27,719; Smith and Gracelon, 30,121, being Fusion majority of 2,402. Aggregate vote received has increased about five per cent., which indicates aggregate of about 146,588. As each vote increased about same Republicans should have about 12,500, Fusionists 13,500; Prohibition and scattering 509, amendment making plurality. Choice of Governor is uncertain, also biennial elections. Fourth and fifth Congressional were districts Fusion; first, second and third Republican. Republicans claim first district and Democrats concede it.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.

There is great rejoicing to-night at headquarters of Democratic National Committee over news from Maine.

HAVANA, Sept. 13.

Twenty deaths have resulted from yellow fever for the week ending Friday night.
