SPORT ECHOES

THIS AFTERNOON at Charlottetown Driving Park harness racing is the order of the day once again.

Last Monday's disastrous fire at the local race plant appeared to have called a halt to proceedings for the 1959 but horsemen and Frank 'Duck' Acorn got into a huddle and they came out of it smiling.

The general race secretary and classifier of Charlottetown Driving Park leased the track from the Exhibition association and the races are a reality once again with purses for the horsemen coming on a percentage basis after necessary expenses are paid.

SOME OF the horses at the local track probably could have gone to other Maritime tracks but there are many who would have had to ship home had racing stopped at the Charlottetown oval. Even those horsemen who might have shipped to the mainland were anxious to raise out of Charlottetown and they went along with 'Duck' wholeheartedly in his plan to keep 1959 racing alive.

The Exhibition association would gladly have continued their program had not a necessary delay of a week or ten days cropped up. Insurance adjusters are hard at work on the first site and the track management could do nothing until everything was cleared up. When their race secretary and classifier, Mr. Acorn, made the offer to them to lease the track, the exhibition officials were in full accord with the plan.

THIS GETTING racing moving again was not easy and 'Duck' Acorn spent a busy few days trying to iron out all the details. He is confident that things are set for 2 o'clock this afternoon when the first dash of an eight-dash card gets away.

A quick glance at the card (it appears on today's sport page) gives us the impression that it is one of the best race programs of the entire season. These horses are not a bunch of leftovers but the cream of the crop that have been racing in such fine style over Charlottetown track all season.

Those who had passes through 1959 will have to pay admission fee for the balance of the year. But surely, in view of the present setup, no true racing fan will whimper over this. If racing is to continue for some weeks yet, then admissions and parimutuel betting must be sufficient to cover expenses and leave something sizeable for splitting among the money winners in the various dashes.

The International trotting champion, from France, surprised 10,000 spectators by turning in a mile at the DuQuoin State Fair mile track in 1:38 4/5. It was split up as follows: quarter—25; the half in 58 4/5; three-quarters in 1:29 3/5 and the mile in 1:58 4/5.

Our readers will remember that Janina was the winner of the \$50,000 International Trot at the Roosevelt Raceway on August 1st. His above mile was not the fastest trotted over the DuQuoin track. Seven years ago, the trotter Star's Pride set the record at 1:57 1/5.

Scott Frost is by the world's greatest sire of trotters, Hoot Mon, and there are signs pointing to the fact that he may wear the mantle as a leading sire of trotter, following in the footsteps of his sire.

C. T. Black of Pleasantdale Farm, Berryville, Virginia, is greatly pleased with the performances of his two-year-old pacer, Major Fingo, by Calumet Fingo 2:04, that won at Saratoga Springs in 2:07 2/5, with the last half in 1:02 2/5 and the final quarter in 30 2/5.

Island drivers distinguished themselves at Halifax Wednesday night, with Chrudade, driven by James MacGregor, placing 1-2 in the first and fourth races. Just Rita (D. Walsh) 7-1, Bookmer (R. Creamer) 2-5, time 2:11 and 2:13 3/5; Chrudade owned by the Scottish Stables, Halifax, and Just Rita by G. C. and K. Cruikshank, Halifax, Races 2 and 6—T. O. F. (D. Ratchford) 1-4, Emperor's Mjms (C. MacLeod) 8-1, Miss Wilma Dale (MacGregor) 4-2, Falcourt Heronine (G. Muger) 2-7, time 2:10 4/5 and 2:08 4/5; T. O. F. owned by G. Kennedy, Halifax, and Emperor's Miss by Frank T. Stanfield, Truro.

Ernie O'Brien, manager of the Moncton Raceway, has made a good success of it this year and is now planning on three nights a week because of an influx of horses from other tracks. At Indianapolis, Indiana, last Tuesday, Bullet Hanover, paced to a world record for two-year-olds of 1:57 flat. In the first heat of the \$50,000 Fox Stakes, he won in 1:57, and he also won the second heat in 1:59. He was driven by Johnny Simpson and was bred at Hazenover Shoe Farm, and is now owned by the former Grand Circuit star trainer and driver, Thomas W. Murphy, in partnership with L. B. Sheppard, owner of Hanover Shoe Farm where Bullet Hanover was foaled. Bullet Hanover also made a two-year record of 3:56; the former mark was 3:57 3/5 at Lexington, Kentucky, in the same stake, set by Torpid.

At Saint John Raceway last Wednesday night, Holbert Gratton, owned by the Elliot Stable of Saint John and driven by Blair Andrew of New Glasgow, P.E.I.,

"O'Brien, a grey-haired man of 41 years, says it is almost impossible to compare Blaze Hanover yet to the great Scott Frost, or to Brogue Hanover—the current three-year-old star in the S.A. Camp Stable, or to Butch or Bond Hanover—all of which were big stakes-winning trotters at two years of age for O'Brien and the Camp Stable."

"So far, Blaze Hanover has done his big winning on the strength of his wonderful manners," O'Brien explained. "He is game and fast, and he continues developing more speed. "Shadow Wave, at this moment, is at Roosevelt Raceway and in training, but persistent leg fillings have prevented the superb chestnut from getting to the races. O'Brien is hopeful that Shadow Wave will be back in competition before it's time to depart from Lexington, Ky., around October 1st."
