The incident connected with the Prince's visit to the United States is suggestive of striking reflections.

Accompanying the uncrowned monarch of the millions which now compose the American population, he paid a tribute of international respect by visiting the tomb of the Father of his Country, the Cincinnati of America—George Washington.

Proceeding down the Potomac, with bated speed, and mournfully tolling bell, as the hallowed sepulchre is approached—the descendant in the third generation of George the Third of England—the son of his living grand-daughter—renders the public recognition of his nation to the purity of motives and patriotic civility of the mighty dead, by reverently standing uncovered by his tomb.

Who is he that comes like an honour'd guest, With banner, and with music, with soldier and with priest, With a nation weeping and breaking on my rest?

It is time, however, that we should bring our remarks to a close, and we pass hurriedly on, as did the illustrious subject of them, to his departure from the American continent—which, it is probable, he may never revisit, as he will not be liable to the contingency of being sent on his travels, as other European Royalties sometimes are.

Having been cordially welcomed to Portland, precisely at the time appointed, he bade his American hosts a cordial farewell, and entering his barge, was transferred to his ship amid the booming of guns and the cheers of the excited people whose land he was leaving.

AWFUL CALAMITY! A Gloucester correspondent informs the Boston Journal that intelligence has been received at that port of the loss of one of the mackerel catches which left the Bay of St. Lawrence last month with a full cargo.

What damage the steamer sustained is not known, as she passed on without offering any assistance to the schooner. The wind blowing fresh from the northward, they found it impossible to reach the Nova Scotia shore, and after drifting about for two days, headed for the West Islands, but had proceeded but twenty-four hours when she became water-logged and unmanageable.

The vessel which rescued them was a Portuguese. She carried them to St. Domingo, where they were kindly treated and sent home by the American Consul. The name of the schooner is not given, neither the names of the captain nor crew. The steamer was probably one outward bound, as no intelligence of such a collision has been received on this side of the Atlantic.

The markets are well supplied with country produce. Potatoes from P. E. Island sell from 1s. to 1s. 3d. per bushel, Nova Scotia potatoes command a higher price. A large quantity of Apples and Cheese from Annapolis are at present in the market.
