

(From a Shetland Correspondent.)

INTERESTING NARRATIVE.

The following brief particulars, which were gleaned from a respectable individual, who was perfectly acquainted with the subject of this narrative in her childhood, and who saw and conversed with her a few days ago, may be received as perfectly authentic.

About twenty-six years ago, two female children, one aged nine, the other seven years, daughters of an industrious poor man named Keith, residing at the Butternut Ridge, in this County, was sent one morning by their parents to drive home their cows, which were browsing in the woods near to and adjoining their residence.

About ten days ago, the elder of these children, now a woman advanced in years, dressed in the habiliments of an Indian's squaw, made her appearance at a house contiguous to the residence of her aged mother and brothers, accompanied by an Indian, supposed to be her husband.

The inmates of the house, judging from her conversation, and other prominent traces in her manner, countenance and demeanor, that something transcendent of the Indian character was peculiarly developed in her, immediately figured to themselves that she bore a striking resemblance to the Keith family; recollections of the past flew to remembrance, and after a brief consultation with her, they finally determined with themselves to send for her whom they supposed to be her mother; who, on her appearance, was instantly recognized, and both flew into each other's arms in a flood of tears.

Information of these particulars has been transmitted to Prince Edward Island, with the hope that some clue may transpire, in order, if possible, to effect the recovery of her sister. These transactions are in current circulation in this neighbourhood.

HUGOBUNT.—The following interesting communication (says the Newcastle Journal) has been handed to us by the writer, whose name is subscribed, and relating as it does to an event of such importance as the memorable battle on the plains of Waterloo, will be read with much interest.

"Along with the detachment of British and Foreign troops which Wellington posted at Hugobunt, for its defence, was a brigade of English, consisting of the Light and 7th companies of the Coldstream Guards. No sooner were the Guardsmen fairly within the Chateau garden, than the temptingly ripe cherries drew their attention, and the soldiers were to be seen plucking them off the wall trees by handfuls, quite regardless of the shot and shells which were incessantly pouring in amongst them.

Once the French broke into the court yard, and such a scene of bayonet work I, the narrator of this article, never before or since beheld. It was fairly a trial of strength—the French grenadiers were not to be trifled with, and we looked like so many butchers red with gore, or rather like so many demons rioting against fire, for the shells had set two haystacks in a blaze, and many a poor fellow, bleeding and wounded, being unable to get out of the way, was burnt to death.

Though now 27 years have rolled away since that dreadful scene took place, yet it is fresh in my mind's eye, and my ears yet tingle with the yells of those misguided Frenchmen, as they were tumbled into the fiery furnace. Charge after charge, and cannonade after cannonade, were repeated on this devoted post, yet still it was not carried.

OLD FARMERS.—There are in Wrentham, Mass., twenty-seven aged farmers, the oldest of whom is 88, and the youngest 70 years old. They are all heads of families, and most of them swung the scythe with their sons and grandsons last summer.

It is supposed that the number will reach, before the season is over, 150,000. The meat is said to be very fine. A proportion of the provisions put up this season has been for Europe and other foreign markets.
