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President of 1000 shot down Liberal Nuclear Draws Flood Of Criticism



LOME, Togo (AP)—Military insurgents killed President Sylvanus Olympio in front of the United States Embassy and arrested most of his ministers in an apparently successful coup Sunday.

Then they radiated an appeal to a Togo exile in neighboring Ghana to return to head the revolutionary movement.

The exile is Idrissou Antoine Metchi, a Togolese opposition leader in the Chamber of Deputies. A French-educated Moslem, Dahomey, civil servant, Metchi had been arrested in 1960 for conspiracy. He went to Ghana after his release in mid-1961.

Informed sources in Cote d'Ivoire said Nicolas Grunisky, a former Togo premier believed to be the insurgents' first choice to take over the government, had reconsidered his earlier refusal to return.

Grunisky, 49, who has been living as a refugee in Cote d'Ivoire since 1958, is a brother-in-law of Olympio and a Progress Party member.

Neither Britain nor the Common Market countries have set a deadline for the negotiations resuming here today but it was generally recognized that final solution must be found within the next two months. The negotiations between Britain and the "six" have been going on for 14 months.

Dealing specifically with Mr. Pearson's statement urging acceptance of nuclear warheads for the forces in NATO and NORAD, Mr. Douglas said: "Nothing could be more unrealistic than Mr. Pearson's statement that while the finger of the U.S. will be on the trigger, Canada will not hold the safety catch."

Mr. Justice J. T. Thorson, honorary president of the Canadian Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament said his group is shocked and disappointed by the Liberal party's stand on nuclear arms.

In a statement, Mr. Justice Thorson, 73, president of the Executive Court of Canada said: "The Canadian Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament is deeply disappointed with the statement by the leader of the Liberal party that Canada should acquire nuclear arms for the use of its own forces."

"The Liberal party has given the impression in the past that it was not in favor of the acquisition of nuclear weapons by Canada and that Canada would acquire nuclear arms for the use of its own forces."

Mr. Harkness said he had no comment on the contents of Mr. Pearson's statement.

Mr. G. Douglas, New Democratic Party leader, said the Canadian people should be given an opportunity at the polls to decide whether or not Canada will accept nuclear weapons—and the sooner the better.
