

DAMAGE BY LIGHTNING.—Lightning set fire to the barns of Shedrick Stairs, at Southampton, York county, recently, and they were totally destroyed, together with their machinery, harness, etc. During the same storm a young man named Ricker was instantly killed near Millville. —St. John Gazette.

THE ROPE WAS SAVED.—Up on the Miramichi River the other day a man was drowning. There was a raft of logs nearby with which he could have been reached. An axe would have cut the rope holding the raft in an instant; but to injure the rope it was leisurely united at the loss of three minutes. During that time the man was drowned, but the rope was saved. —Moncton Transcript.

MAINE'S APPLE CROP.—There is every indication now that the Maine apple crop for 1899 will be unusually small, less, in fact, than that of 1898, which was below the average. Reliable reports show that while in sections the trees have been despoiled of both fruit and foliage and trees did not bloom as a rule. Baldwins will be very scarce. The same condition is reported from the apple region of New York. It is a public calamity when this fruit is short.

GILDED WITH COINS.—Greek divers, who are working on the wreck of the Russian flagship which was sunk in Grecian waters in 1770, say that the bulk of the vessel is literally gilded with gold and silver coins. The attention of the divers is directed only to the gold coins, of which 11,000 have already been recovered, and the sum is being largely added to every day. The divers say that the bottom of the sea about the wreck is heaped with silver pieces of the size of a dollar, together with jewels, swords and other articles of value.

SUMMER SCHOOLS.—A novelty in the way of summer schools is offered in Missouri this year. The state university has given instruction along the lines familiar in such schools during the vacation season for a good while past, and it now adds new courses, in horticulture and agriculture. President Jesse holds that some other attention should be given in the public schools of an Agricultural state to studies of soil, climate, birds, insects and plant life; and he points out that the fields, forests and highways in the country, the houses and public squares in cities and towns, furnish all the laboratory facilities which are need for such studies. The only thing lacking is the requisite knowledge on the part of teachers, and the new courses in the university's summer schools are intended to supply this defect.

EXPLORER SETTLES DOWN.—Nansen, the explorer, is now known as a Norwegian farmer, with no other ambition than to outstrip his neighbors in the production of high class cattle, horses, poultry, butter, eggs, and vegetables. It is concluded that he has seen enough of privation in the far north and in the lecture field, and that hereafter he proposes to live for Mr. Nansen, Mrs. Nansen and the little Nansens. Other arctic explorers, when fortunate enough to return, have sometimes come to a similar conclusion. General Greeley seldom leaves Washington, except when compelled to do so, and it is not often that any of Peary's early companions take wing. It is not likely that if Peary once more gets home safely he will ever make another "dash for the pole." Swedish scientists are hopeful for Andree's return this summer if their hopes are realized, probably he will conclude that Sweden is good enough for him and leaves the pole to take care of itself.
