Son's Projected Outing Should Be Called Off

Dear Mary Haworth: I learned recently that a young bachelor friend of mine is planning a sexual outing. This statement is not gossipy but comes from a security officer in a government department.

The family has known the young man for several years and our children just adore him. Some months ago he and my 14-year-old son made plans for a weekend camping trip in late October. Now I am resolved to tell the child go. But how can I explain to him why? A simple answer would be to tell him that a scheduled outing was cancelled.

How am I to treat the whole situation? I feel it will be difficult in any case. We have two younger daughters who also will have to be told something. To make matters worse, my husband is away and can't speak for me. Thanks for help, D.P.

Dear D.P.: In general, hardy children don't mind being occasionally mixed-up elders they may encounter on the fringes of the family circle.

Rather, normal children show a keen instinct for sensing and reacting to the atmosphere of their family. They are not so easily misled by psychologically warped adults.

Assuming the bachelor has a definite difficulty, he will comprehend, without your spelling it out, why you've seen fit to annul the arrangement. If not, why may even feel secretly, profoundly relieved at having the occasion of legitimate removed from his path.

As for how to explain things to your son, you may be tough, at age 14, to digest probably a straightforward off-the-record talk with a security officer about the homosexual phenomenon.

I recall what a fine educator, head of a private secondary school, once said on the subject of precautionary sex instruction: "Better years too soon than an hour too late."

For guidance in speaking frankly, factually and in good faith on this subject, I suggest of the readers' advisory service at your local public library. Get reading lists of books that will add to your clarity.
