

COMMONWEALTH CABLE LINK

A round-the-world cable which may help make Canada a world communications hub is in prospect. Delegates to the Commonwealth economic conference in Montreal last month decided in principle to build the globe-girdling telephone and telegraph cable service. The map shows the probable route of the cable linking the countries of the Commonwealth. Total cost of the system, which may be completed in 10 years, is estimated at \$245,000,000 but only \$210,000,000 in new money would be needed because financing has already been arranged for the Canada-U.K. cable stage.

Fifth French Republic Inaugurated On Sunday

PARIS (AP)—The fifth French republic came into being Sunday. Frenchmen hope it will give them a more stable government and renewed confidence from abroad. The republic's constitution, approved a week ago in a referendum, was published Sunday in the government journal. Thus Oct. 5, 1958, for history's sake, becomes the birthday of the fifth republic. For the next four months, Premier Charles de Gaulle will have a free hand over domestic and foreign affairs of France while he installs new governmental machinery. During this interim, elections will be held for a new parliament and a new president under rules which de Gaulle will establish. Many expect the 67-year-old premier to be a candidate for the presidency, a much more powerful office than it has been heretofore. In the next six months, a new French "community of nations" will be established, including those eligible overseas territories which approved the constitution. Only Guinea in West Africa turned it down and thus became independent.

EXECUTIVE STRONGER
The new constitution takes much power from parliament and invests it in the executive, shared by a president and a premier. Parliament will probably have about 460 members instead of the present 595 and will not be able to unseat a premier with such irresponsible ease as in the past. France had 26 governments in the 13 years since the war. The first republic, following the French revolution, dates from 1792 to 1804 when Napoleon became emperor. The second republic was set up in 1848 and lasted only three years, when Napoleon's nephew, Louis, became emperor in a coup. The third continued from 1875 until the invasions of the Germans in the Second World War. The fourth republic, inaugurated Jan. 1, 1947, technically died Sunday. But it had already lost its effectiveness when a military-

civilian junta seized government headquarters in Algiers May 13. The junta feared Paris was about to go to the aid of Algerian rebel demands for independence. The Algerian rebellion, which will be four years old Nov. 1, remains the new republic's major problem. De Gaulle took a first step toward a possible solution Friday when he offered the Moslems a louder political voice and improved economic and educational conditions. First reactions have been cool from the newly proclaimed Algerian rebel government. The death of D. Jerome Gillis, Charlottetown, occurred early this morning in Montreal following a surgical operation performed there last Thursday. The 58-year-old businessman was a partner in William Condon and Sons Woollen Mills and had been manager of the plant since 1945. Active in many organizations, he was at the time of his death vice-chairman of the Workmen's Compensation Board of P.E.I., a member of the Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus, and a member of the Basilia Men's Club. A native of St. Peter's Bay, he was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Daniel Gillis, lifetime residents of that district. He is survived by his wife, the former Ada Condon, of Charlottetown; one son, William, 19; and two daughters, Regina, 22; and Marylee, 11. Also surviving are three brothers — Rev. Adolphus, Edmond, Alberta; Peter, Quincy, Mass.; and Brendon, St. Peter's; and three sisters — Anna, Mrs. Thomas Ledwell, St. Peter's; Miss Mary Gillis, R.N.; and Catherine, C.N.D., Montreal. One sister, Regina, and one brother Joseph predeceased him.

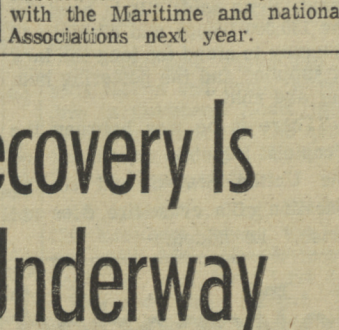
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Fisheries Council To Hold Convention Here In 1964

The Fisheries Council of Canada will hold their national convention in Charlottetown in 1964. A. Walther Gaudet, secretary of the local Council announced Saturday. To accommodate the 400 delegates expected, the entire facilities of the Charlottetown Hotel were booked for April 1-3 scheduled dates of the nation-wide meeting. Decision to hold the 1964 conference here was made at an executive meeting held recently in Montreal. Mr. Gaudet noted. The fact that the Confederation centenary would be celebrated in this Province that year added considerable weight to the pressure exerted by the local executive, he said, adding that Mr. J. E. Burden, the president, had extended the invitation to this year's convention held at Halifax, and also at the convention held the year previously. "Conventions such as this play an extremely important part in the success of such civic or provincial celebrations," Mr. Gaudet who was chairman of Charlottetown's 1955 Centennial Committee, noted. "We were fortunate enough to attract 46 groups here during our civic centenary," he said, "but we started our solicitations too late." Agitation should commence right away and aim at attracting no less than 100 groups, he said, remarking that the City of Ottawa already had a Committee operating on celebrations planned for 1967.

Business Recovery Is Reported Underway

MONTREAL (CP) — Some of the economic indicators now show that business recovery is underway, says the annual report of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, prepared for presentation to the chamber's annual meeting. The report backs up this generally optimistic view with a recitation of favorable developments, but sees continuing dangers "clouding the future" and at the same time sees inflation as an unsolved problem. It envisages a federal government deficit this current fiscal year of \$900,000,000 or more, with no present indication of improvement in the following year. OFFER ALTERNATIVE
As alternatives to the deficit situation it names either reduced government spending or higher taxes. Of the employment situation it says: "It is unlikely that many of the fire predictions and about next winter's unemployment will in fact occur, but it does appear that the business recovery now envisaged will not reduce the number of unemployed in 1958-59 much below last year's levels. It may well be that the country will have to tolerate a somewhat higher level of unemployment than it was accustomed to in the boom years." The report, signed by D. L. Morrell, general manager, will be tabled at today's busy sessions which will mark the opening of the chamber's three-day annual meeting. The text of the report was released to the press Sunday.
