### Layman's Responsibilities Discussed At Conference

Discussion on the responsibilities of the laymen in the light of Vatican

Council II's decree on the apostolate of the laity, highlighted at yesterday's-Maritime area conference of the Christian Family Movement, held at St. Dunstan's University and Basilica Recreation Center.

The conference attracted more than 100 CFM members and chaplains, including representation from Antigonish, Pictou, and Truro. The balance of the registration was from various island parishes.

Theme speakers for the conference were Allan and Lettie Morse, a C.M.F. couple from Avon, P.Q.

The position of the laity in the Church today was introduced through a panel discussion which had Bill Murphy, Charlottetown, as moderator. Members of the panel were J. Elmer Murphy, Summerside; Rev. Gerald Steele, Alberton; and Jerry and Donna MacNeil, Antigonish.

**ESTABLISH HARMONY**  
The panel pointed out that it is the responsibility of the layman to establish harmony between what God has created, and Christ, himself, to apply the message of the Gospel to our own lives and the lives of those around us.

B.M. Callaghan, 66 Bayfield Street, is presently recovering from surgery in the Charlottetown Hospital.

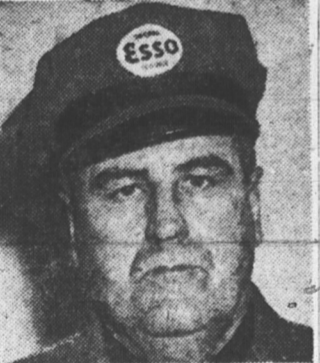

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## C.E. Praught Elected Head Of Canadian Association

Charles E. Praught of Charlottetown Saturday was elected president of the Canadian Diabetic Association at the annual meeting held in Toronto.

Mr. Praught who resides at 236 North River Road, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph A. Praught. He was educated at Queen Square School, Prince of Wales College and St. Dunstan's University.

Popularly known among diabetics in this province as 'Mr. Praught' for more than 20 years, was the prime mover in and District Branch of the CDA in Prince Edward Island. He was its first president and has been the honorary president for the past few years.

Mr. Praught has for several years been vice president of the National Association which has more than 5,000 members and 30 or more branches across the country.

Charlie is administrative assistant in the department of health at the present time—formerly he was chief accountant—and his duties include administration of the diabetic control program. Under this program all known diabetics in the province receive, free of charge, required supplies of anti-diabetic medicine and testing materials for the control of their condition. This is the only province where diabetic medicines are made available to diabetics without charge.

Two years ago Mr. Praught was presented with the 'Diploma of Merit' for 'outstanding contribution and dedication in the advancement of the association'. The award is from the CDA.

A war veteran, Mr. Praught enlisted with the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps active force in September 1939 and was discharged March 21, 1946. He was appointed to the rank of Warrant Officer Class One, March 1940 and held that rank until his discharge. He served in a number of military hospitals in Canada and Newfoundland as well as on several hospital ships during the war.

The versatile Charlottetown man is treasurer of the Hospital Association of Prince Edward Island, vice-president of the Maritime Hospital Association, chairman of the Superannuation committee of the Public Servants Association, member of the American diabetic association, the American association of hospital accountants, Canadian public health association, the P.E.I. historical association, Royal Canadian Legion, Charlottetown Curling Club and the Fourth Degree, Knights of Columbus. He is married to the former Gladys Costello of Charlottetown.

Mr. Praught's hobbies are photography and travelling. He has already visited every Canadian province and most of the eastern United States. Two years ago he toured eight countries of Europe and intends to tour the United Kingdom this summer.

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**BERLIN WALL Closed Again**  
BERLIN (AP)—The Berlin wall was closed to West Berliners again Sunday night at the end of the two-week Pentecost visiting period.

Nearly 468,000 West Berliners had crossed over into the eastern half of the divided city to make one-day visits to relatives since the pass period began May 23.

The pass agreement of March 7, which provided for Easter, Pentecost and hardship passes, expires June 30. Passes for hardship cases, but only on a west-to-east basis, will continue until that time.

East German and West Berlin negotiators are expected to work out a new hardship-pass agreement after that date, but it isn't known when they will open talks on future holiday pass periods.

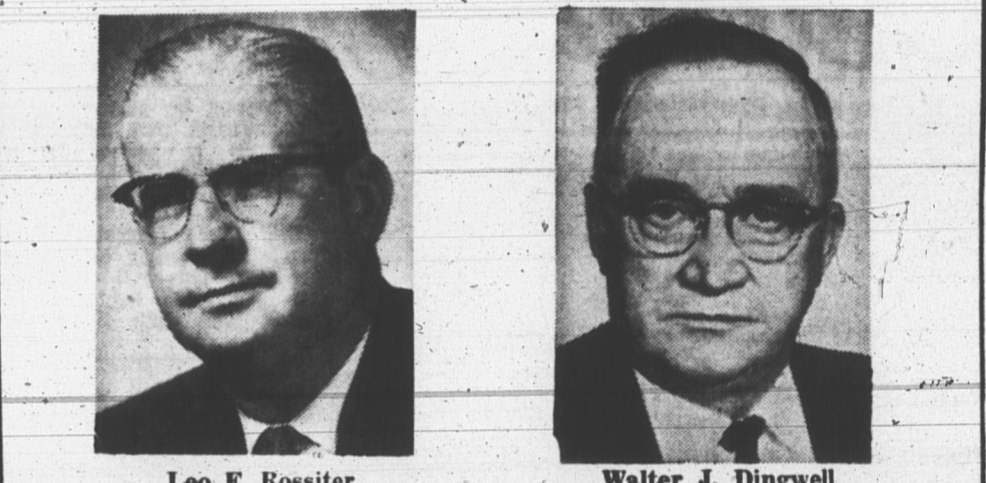

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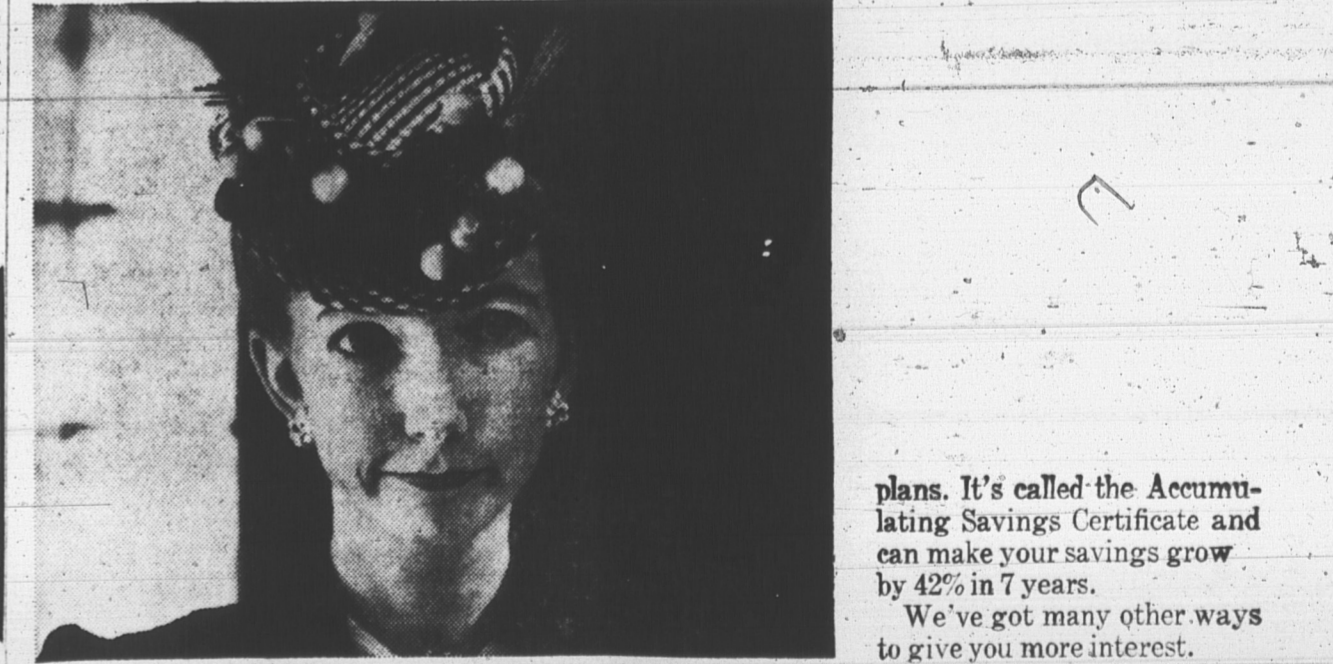
