However, Pleven made no mention of such plans as he told the assembly the French Cabinet is pleased at the prospective Truman-Attlee meeting. Attlee probably will speak on behalf of most Commonwealth Governments as well as his own. He is expected to insist that possible use of the atom bomb against the Chinese is a question which the United Nations -- not the United States alone -- must decide. Government sources said all Commonwealth countries feel Truman's atom-bomb remarks will damage Western policy throughout Asia.

To Buy Cheese As the conference closed, Sir Andrew Jones, head of the British Food Mission in Canada, announced that the United Kingdom would be prepared to buy 77,000-000 pounds of Canadian cheese in 1951 at a price still to be determined. This is the same amount as Britain is taking in 1950. Mr. Gardiner disclosed Thursday that the U. K. also would buy 130,000,000 pounds of Canadian bacon next year.

W. I. Provincial Executive Meeting

The first meeting of the Provincial Executive of the Women's Institutes since the return of the President from the Continent, was held in the Rest Room on Thursday, with a full attendance of members. Mrs. MacLeod, the President, presided.

Mr. Allen, Organizer for the Children's Aid Society, was present and after explaining the purpose and need of this Society requested the assistance of the Women's Institute in the drive for funds being conducted throughout the province. "By a house to house canvass of each local district you will help to speed up the work and enable this organization to get started on a firm basis" he said. Mr. Allen cited many cases of neglected children who have been placed in good foster homes by Children's Aid Societies in other provinces and thus enabled to become good citizens instead of juvenile delinquents.

Resolutions were dealt with, and several committees responsible for them reported progress. Miss Roblin reported her consultation with Civil Defence organizer, Mr. Pate. In case of an emergency the Women's Institutes would be asked to care for evacuees, supervise distribution of food and clothing, and serve hot lunches at arrival centres. She called attention to the Civil Defence Meetings to be held in the near future in different areas and asked that all Institutes send representatives to these important meetings.

Material for Institute News was discussed, and it was explained that the majority of Institutes sent in recipes instead of original articles written by their members. It was suggested that an Editor be appointed for the News, but this matter was held over for another meeting.

Mrs. MacLeod reported the highlights of her recent trip to Copenhagen, Denmark, where she attended the Sixth Triennial Conference of the Associated Country Women of the World. The meetings were held in Christianborg Castle in Copenhagen, from September 6th to 18th, inclusive. Mrs. MacLeod spoke of the wonderful inspiration it had been to see women from so many different countries of the world, speaking so many different languages, meeting together to formulate plans for the improvement of living conditions among rural peoples everywhere. The important resolutions passed at this conference recorded the interests, the feeling and the judgment of these country women of the world. Mrs. Raymond Sayre (who had visited here and spoken at Annual Convention) was re-elected President of A. C. W. W., and Mrs. E. E. Morton (President of the F. W. I. C.) was elected 1st Vice-President. Invitations for the next Conference to be held in 1953 were made by both Canada and Australia. It was left with the A. C. W. W. Executive to decide which invitation should be accepted.

Mrs. MacLeod said that each local Institute could contribute to the work of the A. C. W. W. by answering roll-calls in February with "Pennies for Friendship". Questioned as to living conditions, especially the available foods, Mrs. MacLeod particularly noted the abundance of cheese served in Denmark -- for every meal, in some form or other. Small wonder that Denmark ranks first in cheese consumption (17.8 pounds per capita annually). In Canada consumption is only 4 pounds per person per year.

Mrs. Harold Laird reported a highly successful Short Course in Dramatics held at Highfield with Mr. Donald Wetmore as instructor capably assisted by Mrs. J. P. Millar. Seventeen people from various rural dramatic groups were taking the full course, with additional participants for the evening sessions. Mrs. Laird commended the instructive and helpful films shown; and the charming exhibition of Folk Dancing given by Mrs. John MacKinnon and her pupils.

It was announced that the Clothing Drive recently conducted for the Unitarian Services of Canada had been most successful. Over a ton of warm clothing is packed and ready to be shipped. Upon motion, the meeting adjourned. The moon was observed for the first time through a telescope by Galileo in 1610.
