The American League showed little change as the top three contenders split doubleheaders with Kansas City taking a pair from Detroit 8-4 and 5-4.

The New York Yankees maintained their three-game advantage over Cleveland beating Washington 5-3 after the Senators had won the opener 2-2 in 10 innings. The Indians, after spraying 16 hits for an easy 9-1 victory over Chicago, were shut out by Billy Pierce of the White Sox 5-0 in the second game.

Baltimore and Boston also divided a pair, the Orioles walking off with an 8-6 victory in the opener and the Red Sox coming back to capture the second game 8-1.

Bob Speake homered in each game for the Cubs. The rookie outfielder hit his ninth of the year in the ninth inning of the opener, won by the Cubs in the 10th with a four-run rally. Speake broke up the second game with his 10th homer in the 10th inning.

TWO FOR CAMPANELLA

Roy Campanella also wallpopped a pair of homers. The Dodger backstop drove in three runs with his 11th homer to help Russ Meyer gain his third victory in the opener and boosted his league leading RBI total to 44 with his 12th homer in the eighth.

Willie Mays smashed his 12th four-bagger with a runner on base in the eighth inning to give the Giants the first game victory over the Phils' Curt Simmons. The Phils got four hits off Don Liddle and two relief pitchers in the nightcap but made them all count as Bob Kuzava, Baltimore castoff, turned in his first National League victory.

George Crowe, subbing for Joe Adcock at first, paced Milwaukee to its double triumph. He drove in the winning run in the opener and hit a three-run homer in the first inning of the nightcap.

Pinch hitters broke up both games between New York and Washington. Mickey McDermott singled in the winning run in the 10th inning for the Senators as Bob Porterfield outduelled Bob Turley. Irv Noren's pinch single drove in the winning Yankee runs in the seventh inning of the nightcap.

SIX-HITERS

Bob Lemon hurled a six-hitter for his seventh Cleveland victory in the first game and Pierce won his fourth with a seven-hit eighth-inning job for the White Sox in the second game.

Baltimore overcame Ted Williams' three-run homer in the first inning—his first—to win the opener with two tie-breaking runs in the ninth. Ike Delock turned in a four-hitter to give the Sox a split.

R. C. A. F. Station Exceeds Blood Donor Objective

Flyweight Boxing Champ Defeats Jap

TOKYO (AP)—World flyweight boxing champion Pascual Perez of Argentina blasted ex-champ Yoshio Shirai of Japan into retirement Monday night in five one-sided rounds before 18,000 fans.

The Argentine boxer punched the sleek Japanese into a glassy-eyed wreck. Shirai was on his knees when he bell ended the fifth round and his boxing career.

It was Perez' first defence of the crown he won from Shirai last Nov. 15 on a 15-round decision last November.

He looked forward to a possible bout with Weichman Dai Dower in London—"if the price is right."

Shirai's American manager, Dr. Alvin Cahn, announced the retirement of the 32-year-old Japanese boxer after the lopsided bout. Shirai was battered to the floor five times.

The ex-champion staggered Perez at the opening bell when the Argentine suddenly realized he had forgotten his mouthpiece and turned to his corner to retrieve it.

Yanks Upset Victims In Golf Tourney

ST. ANNES, England (AP)—Two of America's Walker Cup team, Don Cherry and Dick Yost, were upset victims Monday in the first round of the British amateur golf championship.

Cherry, a Wichita Falls, Tex., amateur who was one of the adroitest favorites for the crown, fell before Guy Wolstenholme of England, 2 and 1. Yost, from Portland, Ore., was beaten on the 21st hole by James Anthony Mahon of Ireland.

It was the first extra hole match of the tournament.
