THE unfortunate man, Turner, so badly injured by a falling rock hanging at the Spring Hill mine, as noticed in our despatches a day or two ago, has since died. The mines were shut down in consequence. THE Journal is agitating for new sidewalks and street lights for Summerside. A few additional lights and some new sidewalks in Charlottetown would add greatly to the comfort and safety of pedestrians. THE London Standard says the Czar has asked Prince Waldemar to become a candidate for the Bulgarian throne, but it is rumored the King of Greece has advised his brother not to accept so dangerous an honor. A PUBLIC MEETING is to be held in Summerside to-morrow evening, to consider the matter of the purchase of a steam fire engine and the organization of fire companies. This is a step in the right direction and one which should have been taken long ere this. MR. L. E. BRECKEN, who won first place in a tennis match, played for a silver cup presented by Richard Sloggett, Esquire, was yesterday waited upon by a deputation of club members and formally presented with the trophy in question. THE so-called Sir Roger, Tielborne, better known as Arthur Orton, made famous as the Tielborne claimant, is now living in destitution in New York. He is confined to a small room, and is attended by his alleged wife. His coming to America to lecture was a sad failure and he now bitterly regrets having done so. He is anxious to get home. THE schooner Wallace, Capt. Reid, arrived from Pugwash to-day with a cargo consisting of twenty-eight tons of pressed hay, a portion of which is consigned to Mr. Gay, and the remainder is for sale. This is the second cargo of hay brought here this season by Capt. Reid. The first was sold for \$12.25 per ton, and the present lot will be disposed of for \$13 per ton. WALTER MORRIS, a youth 16 years of age and an employe in Mr. Gregory's mill, Carleton, N. B., met with a serious accident there on Tuesday morning. A slab fell from a saw and striking Morris across the thighs fractured both of them. Dr. White ordered his removal to the general public hospital, where he was attended by the visiting and attending physicians. At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, a young man named John Aylworth, was given three months imprisonment for entering the assistant steward's room on board the Merrimack, yesterday afternoon and taking therefrom, a suit of underclothing, a white shirt, some collars and cuffs and one gold plated finger ring. An assault case was postponed for eight days. MR. EDMUND YATES, telegraphs from London to the World: "The Queen has decided, after some hesitation, that the thanksgiving service in honor of her jubilee, should be held on Monday, June 20, at 3 o'clock, in Westminster Abbey, and not in St. Paul's Cathedral, as had been generally anticipated. Efforts were made to secure a different decision, but unsuccessfully, a fact which is greatly to be regretted, as St. Paul's Cathedral is admirably adapted for such a ceremonial, while the Abbey is the worst possible place for it. The service in the Cathedral, where it ought to be according to all precedent, would have involved a procession from one end of London to the other, while the progress from Buckingham Palace to the grand entrance of the Abbey will not be a greatly affair than the mere opening of Parliament."

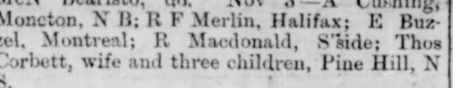
