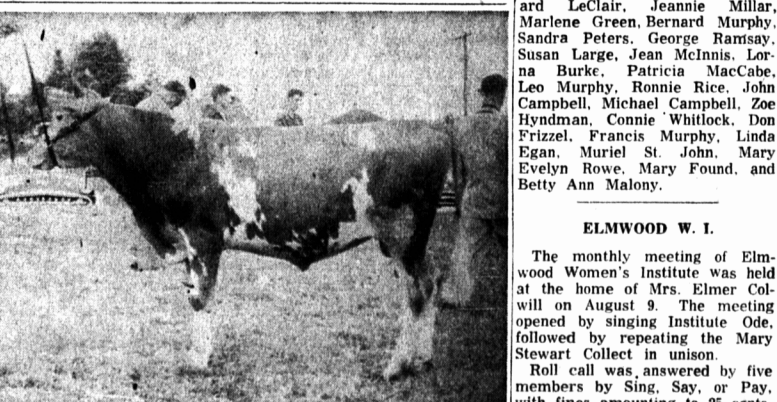
## FEMALE GRAND CHAMPION FOR FOUR YEARS

## Discusses Canadian Cheese Marketing Problem In U. K.

OTTAWA, (CP) — Canadian cheese producers can hope for increased sales in Britain by aiming at the quality market, a government trade authority says. But price competition from New Zealand bars hopes for recovery of the big cheese market Canada once held in the United Kingdom. D. A. B. Marshall, Canada's commercial secretary in London, says it is "manifestly impossible" for Canadian cheddar producers to cut prices by at least 10 cents a pound to compete with New Zealand for the mass market among British housewives. A price cut would be the only way of regaining Canada's big pre-war and wartime volume of 12,000,000 pounds sold to the U. K. in 1938 and the peak of 131,000,000 pounds in 1945. Exports last year dropped to 4,200,000 pounds, down from 14,100,200 in 1953. This compares with New Zealand's sales last year of 203,000,000 pounds. Mr. Marshall, writing in the government's Foreign Trade magazine, said Canada "should aim at the marketing of a smaller quantity of a top quality product for which there is a stentinal market of somewhere between 12,000,000 and 15,000,000 pounds." He said Canada is "virtually Britain's only source of matured cheddar made from unpasteurized milk. British housewives pay 23 cents a pound for New Zealand cheese and 37 cents for the Canadian product. One problem facing Canadian exporters is Britain's control of dollars used in North American

In addition he says the cod, haddock, pollock and other fish when caught on a fly rod provide really thrilling sport but not up to the thrill of catching a mackerel on a rod. Mr. Morgan has also been successful in catching some trout while here but he says in his opinion the mackerel are really tops.

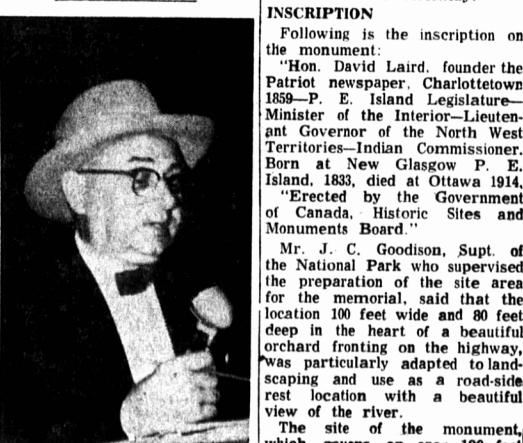
Mrs. Morgan is also an enthusiastic angler and yesterday landed a fifteen pound pollock on a light rod after about a half minute fight. Pollock are quite game and it is no easy job to land a big one on a rod. Then the party returned to the port at Rustico several fishermen said it was one of the biggest landed there for some time. A pollock is a beautifully shaped fish with neat long head and the body has a real game fish appearance. They are not as plentiful as other fish off Rustico but one or two are generally caught every day by fishing parties.

## Veteran Park Caretaker Dies

The death occurred yesterday of Mr. Wallace MacRae, for the past twenty four years caretaker at Victoria Park. He had been in failing health for the past fourteen months and had retired from his duties last month.

Mr. MacRae was born at East Royalty about sixty years ago, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William MacRae. His father had been caretaker of the Park before him. Mr. MacRae took a great pride in his work as caretaker and it was through his efforts that the Park became a scene of beauty which has been admired by citizens throughout the years. His friendly manner gained him many friends not only with the men employed under his supervision but with all who knew him.

Surviving besides his wife, the former Mabel Buck of Dorchester, N. B. are the following children: Gertrude, (Mrs. Roy Clark), Summerside; Lola (Mrs. Angus Milligan), Alberton and Warren of Charlottetown, Brothers and sisters surviving are Lily (Mrs. Fred Vard) and Miss Edith, all of Charlottetown. Another sister, Mrs. William Pugh resides in Michigan. Brothers are Albert and Nelson of this City.

## First Conference

Prof. A. N. Lavrishev, head of the Soviet foreign ministry's scientific department, said Russia is providing Communist China and six east European countries—Poland, Romania, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Bulgaria and East Germany—with experimental nuclear reactors.

## EARLY CAREER

Hon. David Laird was one of the eight children of Hon. Alexander Laird and his wife Janet Orr. The parents were closely associated with the early history of the Island, the father being one of the sturdy Scottish pioneers who did so much to develop a thriving colony from the wilderness, the mother being a member of one of the landlory families whose influence was a large factor through many years of difficulty. A native of Renfrewshire, Scotland, Alexander Laird came to the Island in 1819 and became a prominent member of the Legislature.

Hon. David Laird, after receiving his early education, attended the Presbyterian Theological Seminary at Truro, N.S., with a view to entering the ministry but following his graduation he returned to Charlottetown and founded The Patriot, of which he was editor for almost forty years. His first public office was as a City Councillor.

## Records Broken

Nine new Canadian marks were set Saturday bringing the total for the three days to 29, including one unofficial world record. American entries dominated the list and topped 19 of the records. Of the 10 marks set by Canadians, three fell to Helen Stewart, a 16-year-old from Vancouver. Miss Stewart established records in the junior women's 200-yard medley, the 100-yard freestyle and the 100-yard breaststroke.
