### A CLOUD IN THE ITALIAN SKY

**Proceedings Instituted Against a Newspaper**

Because of its Interpretation of the Pope's Words.

St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 18.—The Globe, Democrat has received a cable despatch from Rome which says: "It is reported here that Zamardelli, Minister of Justice, and the most bitter and relentless of all the foes of the Vatican, has instituted legal proceedings against the Civitta Catolica for its article declaring that the Pontiff, in his response to the address of the Cardinals on December 23, declaring that the Italian monarchy constituted a clamorous rupture with the memories, the sentiments and the historic law of the Italian people, he means that he would prefer the present government overthrown and a republic established in its place."

### SUPREME COURT.

TUESDAY, JAN. 18.  
Before the Chief Justice and a jury.

The Queen in the prosecution of Charles McDonald against John McRae.—Indictment for assault and battery. The hearing of this trial commenced on Saturday morning and was concluded this morning, when the jury returned a verdict of not guilty and the traverser was discharged.

The case was of considerable importance and much interest was taken in it. The facts appeared to be that the defendant McRae sold to the Local Government a strip of land thirty feet wide along the rear of his farm for a public road. Supervisor Dickieson in August 1895 ran or pretended to run what he considered was a line of road at the rear of defendant's farm. The defendant, however, claimed that the road was run too far in on him and that it left a strip of his land on the other side of the newly opened road and refused to allow the road to be run by the supervisor. Matters stood in dispute from Dec. 1895, until Sept. 1897, when Supervisor Dickieson and five other men under him, one of whom was the prosecutor, Charles McDonald, attempted against the will of the defendant to force open the road as laid out in August 1895, but which had been fenced and upon which obstructions had been placed by the defendant. McRae when he saw the Supervisor and his assistants come on the disputed land went down to them and ordered them back and took the Supervisor by the shoulders and put him off. McDonald the prosecutor however refused to retreat and having an axe in his hand or on his shoulder the defendant McRae who had a stick in his hand struck him across the head in order that he would go away. Dickieson then called his men off and the present proceedings were commenced against McRae for the assault and battery on McDonald.

The defence was that the assault was committed in defence of the defendant's land, that the line of road run in 1895 was not in the proper place and the defendant that the law justified him in putting Dickieson and his men off his own land and that the force or blow used on McDonald was necessary to accomplish the purpose. A large amount of evidence was heard, some of it conflicting and contradictory. The jury after hearing the Chief Justice's charge and after a short deliberation returned a verdict for the defendant. Attorney General McDonald for the prosecution; Stewart, Q. C., for the defendant.

Another indictment for an assault committed by the same defendant upon another McDonald was withdrawn by the Crown. The assault arose out of the same line of road.
