a profound understanding of construction by Japan of a new order in East Asia.

"If Great Britain refuses to admit this fundamental point for Japan, there will remain no other course but to suspend the talks."

Japan "must crush any power" that obstructs her program of creating this new order, the Premier declared.

CHUNKING, China, July 6—General Chiang Kai-shek urged powers friendly to China to apply economic measures against Japan and the Japanese people in appeals tonight on the eve of the second anniversary of the outbreak of the Chinese-Japanese war.

His message to the Japanese, following his procedure last year, called on them to "awake from a policy of blind submission to the harsh supervision and save themselves from mad aggression leading to certain ruin and destruction."

He told them to ask a number of questions: Why has the quick victory promised by the militarists dragged on in a two-year war? Why has the Japanese people's burden become increasingly heavy and why have more soldiers been mobilized and sent to the front "but only dead and wounded returned?"

Only an independent, powerful China can assure peace and order in East Asia, he said, not a Sovietized nor a Japan-baiting China.

In his message to the world, the Chinese leader declared "the aim of the Japanese new order for Asia is the ousting of European, American and Asian interests and domination of the Pacific."

He reiterated China's determination to resist to the bitter end, with or without outside help, but warned that Japanese conquest of China would be a preliminary step toward world conquest.

Chiang urged third-power nations to cease buying Japanese goods since their purchases enabled Japanese buying of materials "to intensify the murder of innocent Chinese civilians and the destruction of lives and property of third power nationals in China."

tains the ashes of a Japanese soldier killed in China.

There is a bustle as civilians crowd closer to see, but their faces show nothing. Only the black eyes, curiously alive and burning, tell the emotion that lies behind.

Each company of ash-bearers is small—50, 100 or 200. The total killed, the War Office claims, is less than 60,000. (Neutral experts believe it is much higher.)

SAINT JOHN, N. B., July 6—(CP)—The New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island Regional Committee of the Dominion Drama Festival has received word from the central executive at Ottawa that Prince Edward Island's next annual festival will be held at Charlottetown, P. E. I., and New Brunswick's Feb. 19.

These dates are later than those of previous years. Some time ago, the P. E. I. committee claimed that it was unfair to the Maritimes that they should always be the starting point of adjudications in the dominions.

Poland getting perhaps \$20,000,000. Other countries which may get smaller amounts are: Greece, Egypt, Iraq, Finland and Sweden.

New Zealand will receive a small credit to be used in establishing an aircraft industry.

The move to send Royal Air Force planes to France came as a surprise although several quarters had been urging the Government to demonstrate the nation's air strength for Germany's benefit.

The Air Ministry, however, made no reference to European situation in announcing that the planes, five squadrons in all and including both fighters and bombers, would fly to Le Bourget airbase next Monday and remain until next July 14. On July 14 they will fly over Paris in formation as part of the exercises commemorating the fall of the Bastille.

### In Memoriam

#### GRACE ANNA MACKENZIE

On Friday, June 30, 1939, the Father called to her heavenly home Miss Grace Anna MacKenzie of Belle River, in whose passing a noble Christian has gone on to higher service.

The late Miss MacKenzie was born at Wood Islands on December 10, 1882, the daughter of Janet MacCallum and James D. MacKenzie. For the past number of years Miss MacKenzie was engaged in the nursing profession in United States. By her loving sympathy and devotion to duty, she endeared herself to all.

One year ago she came as usual to spend the summer with her sister, and in October entered the Prince Edward Island Hospital where she underwent a serious operation. She recovered sufficiently to return to her home for the winter, but seven weeks ago she was again hospitalized where on June 30th she fell asleep in Jesus.

The funeral services which were held on July 3rd from the residence of her sister, were conducted by Rev. R. H. Staver, assisted by Rev. W. B. MacPhail and Rev. Wallace Wadland. The hymns, "The Lord's My Shepherd," "Safe in the Arms of Jesus," and "Forever With the Lord," were sung. A solo, "Sleep On, Beloved," a favorite hymn of the deceased was feelingly rendered by Mr. Cameron MacPhee. The floral tributes were many and beautiful. The pallbearers were: Messrs. D. J. Riley, Allan D. Stewart, Simon Stewart, Federal Marshall, Charles MacWilliams and Alex. D. Stewart. Interment was in the family plot in Wood Islands cemetery.

The large congregation which formed the procession paid a solemn tribute to one whose passing has left a vacant spot but a hallowed memory in many hearts.

There are left to treasure her memory, Mr. and Mrs. Finlay MacDougall, five nieces and one nephew at her late home; also numerous relatives and friends in Canada and United States. Three brothers and one sister predeceased her some years ago.
