At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon, John Goonough, drunk and incapable, was fined \$3 and costs or 14 days; John Jennings, summoned for harboring a vicious dog, was dismissed with orders; John McDougall, for assaulting Charles McLeod, was fined \$5 and costs or 20 days; Hedley Palmer and Thos. Robins, for creating a disturbance at St. Paul's School-room, during a sacred concert on Saturday night, were each fined \$2 and costs.

More Light.

The letter of Mr. Dodd's book-keeper in to-day's issue throws only a little more light upon the illegal practices of the late Government. At last—after every effort to deceive the public has failed—we have an admission that goods were purchased at the store of Dodd and Rogers after Mr. Dodd became a member of the Administration. This admission only effects the Market Hall declarations of Mr. Dodd. It does not in any way relieve Mr. Dodd from the charge of having deliberately violated the law; for the law was violated, not only after Mr. Dodd became a member of the Government, but also while Mr. Dodd was yet only a member of the Legislative Council.

But the book-keeper says Mr. Dodd knew nothing whatever about the supply of goods by his firm after he became Provincial Secretary and Treasurer. The book-keeper seems to forget that the requisition, or order, for the goods came direct from the Government of which Mr. Dodd was a prominent member. The book-keeper—studiously, or the reverse—makes mention of "Mr. Morrison's requisitions." But Mr. Morrison did not make out the requisitions to Messrs. Dodd & Rogers without the positive orders of the Government—of which Mr. Dodd was a prominent member—through the Head of the Department.

In at least one instance the requisition was made out in the handwriting of a fellow-member of the Government of which Mr. Dodd was Secretary and Treasurer. It is useless, therefore, to contend that the Government was ignorant of the illegal, but mutually profitable, little trade carried on between Messrs. Dodd & Rogers and Mr. Thomas Dodd, the sworn guardian of the public funds, and Mr. W. D. Stewart, the wrong-doing ex-Commissioner of Public Works.

As we before stated, we have no desire to press unduly the incontrovertible evidence in these illegal transactions. Let credit be given the statement of the disobedient book-keeper. It does not in the slightest degree effect the culpability of Mr. Dodd and all the rest of the official members of the late Government.

EVIDENCES that the National Policy is a great boon to the Canadian artisan are visible everywhere. At St. John, Que., the glass factory has resumed operations, and the furnaces are now in full blast.

A TEMPERANCE society was recently formed at Breadalbane. A correspondent says:—"It is the right thing in the right place, and many of the leading men of the village are taking an active part in it."

THE walking match in St. John, between Neagle and Daley, resulted in a victory for the former, who covered 105 miles and 7 laps. The latter left the track after completing his 100th mile. The walk was for \$50.

CHEAP MOLASSES.—A Liverpool N. S., merchant saved the nice little sum of \$80 on a lot of molasses entered a few days since, the duty being lessened that much by the recent change of tariff. A merchant in this city a few days ago saved a like sum on a similar transaction.

THE Government bridge at Granville, New London, under the management of the contractor, Mr. Henry, is being built with despatch. It will be a very substantial structure, and will greatly shorten the distance between Granville and Stanley Bridge.

A TRUCKMAN named Dalziel, who lives on Hill brough street (north), lost a valuable horse on Monday night last. The horse broke from his halter during the night and laid down on a harrow which was in the stable. The teeth of the harrow penetrated his side, and he died from the wound so received on the following morning.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Ottawa and Foreign News.

OTTAWA, April 1.
 A lively debate is expected to-day in the House on the tariff. Messrs. Coursal, T. White, Laurier, Houde and others will speak. Mr. Tasse will probably make his maiden speech in English.

Yesterday, a copy of the correspondence between the Local Governments of P. E. Island and New Brunswick, in regard to the Fishery Award, was laid upon the table. The Government of P. E. Island claim that they are entitled to \$1,000,000, the amount allowed to Newfoundland.

After speaking of the importance of the mackerel fisheries within the three-mile limit on the coast of the Island, and contending that the witnesses on both sides had proved their great value, the correspondence goes on to show that the Province had not surrendered its rights when the terms of Union were agreed upon, and that the only question to be considered was, what proportion of the award they were entitled to.

It is claimed that the ratification of the Washington Treaty, under which the award was made, was enacted by the Government of Prince Edward Island before Confederation, and that the authority to legislate upon their fisheries, vested in the Dominion by the British North American Act, did not imply a right to rent or sell them. The sale or rental of them to the Americans was not, so far as the Island is concerned, made by the Dominion, and the purchase money or rental paid by the Americans for the right to fish therein for twelve years, has never been assigned away from the Province.

The Local Government do not wish to have their portion expended in the construction of public works; but ask that the amount be funded by the Dominion Government, the interest to be paid annually.

The New Brunswick correspondence is brief, and merely requests that no apportionment take place until the Local Government have an opportunity of presenting its claim.

LOBSTER FISHERY.

DEPARTMENT OF MARINE & FISHERIES,
 FISHERIES BRANCH,
 OTTAWA, 22nd March, 1879.

PUBLIC NOTICE is directed to the following Fishery Regulation adopted by the Governor-General in Council on the 13th inst., rescinding all previous Orders in Council relating to the Lobster Fishery:

1. In that part of the Province of Nova Scotia, comprising parts of the Counties of Cumberland and Colchester, on the Bay of Fundy, the Counties of Hants Kings, Annapolis, Digby, Yarmouth, Shelburne, Queen's, Lunenburg, Halifax, Guysborough, Richmond, Cape Breton and Victoria; also in the Province of New Brunswick, comprising part of the County of Westmoreland, on the Bay of Fundy, and the Counties of Albert, St. John and Charlotte, it shall be unlawful to fish for, catch, kill, buy, sell or (without lawful excuse) possess any Lobsters from the first day of August to the first day of April in each year.

2. In that part of the Province of Nova Scotia, comprising the Counties of Inverness, Antigonish, Pictou, and parts of Colchester and Cumberland, on Northumberland Strait; and that part of the Province of New Brunswick comprising the Counties of Westmoreland (in part), Kent, Northumberland, Gloucester and Restigouche; also in the Provinces of Quebec and Prince Edward Island, it shall be unlawful to fish for, catch, kill buy, sell or (without lawful excuse) possess any Lobsters from the 20th day of August to the 20th day of April in each year.

3. It shall be unlawful at any time to fish for, catch, kill, buy, sell or possess any female Lobsters in spawn or with eggs attached, soft-shelled, or any young Lobsters of less size than nine inches in length, measuring from head to tail, exclusive of claws or feelers; and when caught by accident in nets or other fishing apparatus lawfully used for other fish, they shall be liberated alive, at the risk and cost of the owner of the net or other apparatus, or by the occupier of the fishery, on either of whom shall devolve the proof of such actual liberation.
