Rev. Father Walter MacGuigan of St. Dunstan's University will perform the marriage ceremony and celebrate the nuptial mass. Mrs. Joseph Dougan will play the organ, and soloists will be Mr. Frank MacIntyre, who will sing "Pans Angelicus" and, after the mass, "Just For Today" and Miss Maureen Blake, singing Schubert's "Ave Maria" and "Oh Lord I Am Not Worthy."

The bride, who will be given away by her father, is wearing a custom made gown of slate slipper satin, with an intricately pleated skirt falling into a short train, princess style bodice buttoned from a round neck to the waist, and lily sleeves. A seed pearl tiara will hold her three quarter length veil, of tulle illusion, and she will carry mauve orchid and shower on a white kid prayer book.

The bride's attendants are Miss Ethel Trainor and Miss Marica Bradley, who will wear gowns of mauve and mist green respectively, fashioned of sheer sparkling tulle with flecks of gold over taffeta underskirts. Anglican Primate Will Visit Here On June 11

Prince Edward Island will be honoured on Thursday next with an official visit from the Most Rev. Walter Barfoot, D.D., Archbishop of Edmonton, Primate of All Canada.

This will be the first occasion on which Archbishop Barfoot has visited this Province in the course of his duties in the Diocese of Nova Scotia, since his election in 1951 at Victoria, B.C. to the Primacy of the Church of England in Canada.

Archbishop Barfoot has already shown himself a tireless traveller in the interest of the Church. A former Chaplain, he has visited our troops in both Korea and Germany, and observed the Church at work in Japan, India and Pakistan.

The Archbishop comes to this Diocese directly from the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II and no doubt His Grace will be able to give us some first hand impressions of this very religious event.
