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Younger Group Heads Crapaud-Victoria Board

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — The Crapaud-Victoria Board of Trade selected its 1959 officers from among the more youthful members of the board at their annual banquet meeting in Crapaud Hall last evening, attended by approximately 75 persons. George Nicholson succeeds Arthur Simmons as President, while other officers are Norman MacDonald, vice-president; Ralph DeGrasse, re-elected secretary-treasurer; and Councillors are G.M. Thompson, R.N. Dawson, Heber Canfield, John Simmons, William Waddell, Douglas MacKinnon, Gerald Matters, and Frank Myers. Retiring president Arthur Simmons outlined the work done by the Board during the past year when recommendations from the board had served to guide the department of highways in road construction, improvement, and snow plowing. SUPPORTED CAUSEWAY The board had also actively participated in supporting efforts made in the interests of constructing a causeway to the mainland, and had joined with the Summerside Board of Trade in requesting a new car ferry at Borden in the meantime. During the visit of Governor General Massey last spring the board had been asked and had acted as host during his brief visit to that area while visiting the province. A representative of the board had participated in the discussions in Charlottetown in regard to a proposed hospital insurance plan. The board had also sought to have an improved winter mail service, and this matter is still under consideration by the authorities. The board had initiated a project in which two truck loads of food were sent to Spring Hill as a contribution from the residents of the surrounding districts to the Disaster Relief Fund of that community. GUEST SPEAKER William Hayward, manager of the Charlottetown branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia, and president of the Charlottetown Board of Trade, was guest speaker, and dealt with the benefits to a community in having a Board of Trade. Mr. Hayward said that the Board of Trade was one of the best organizations for the development of a community, and noted that there were more than 750 similar boards of trade, all affiliated with the Canadian Chamber of Commerce. He observed that the collective action of members in the board of trade achieved much more than any individual action could accomplish, and it's resulting benefits to a community merited the active support of the community residents in the numerous things accomplished by the board for community advancement. He commended Mrs. Norman MacDonald on response she made in reply to the toast to the ladies, and spoke very highly of the work done in this province by women organizations. URGED BETTER QUALITY Mr. Hayward urged producers in the agriculture and fisheries industries to strengthen the quality of the goods they produce for export, and said there was tremendous room for improvement in P.E.I. for further development and expansion of these industries. He referred to the Crapaud Creamery as being re-organized as one of the best dairies in the province, but pointed out that butter was not being produced in sufficient quantities on the Island to meet the demand elsewhere for this product. Brief remarks were also made by A.H. Hubley, president of the Summerside Board of Trade, who complimented the Crapaud-Victoria board on their activities. Mr. Hubley also emphasized the importance of quality in production, and suggested that the various boards of trades on the Island should have closer liaison with each other, and unite in support of any project which was in the interests of the province, and in line with the views of the various boards. Other guests who were at the meeting included Walter Shaw, leader of the Provincial Progressive Conservative party; and Earl Taylor, past president of the Charlottetown Board of Trade.

SUMMERSIDE — A Summerside man pleaded guilty to a charge of uttering a worthless cheque when he appeared in magistrate's court here Tuesday morning. Magistrate R.S. Hinton, Q.C., adjourned the case three months for sentencing. The accused admitted paying Waldo Stewart for a truck tire with a \$100 cheque that proved worthless when taken to the bank. The accused said he paid Mr. Stewart, the informant, \$15 since the cheque was found to be worthless. He said he would pay the remainder as soon as he found work. He said he was married, has four children and is married to a Summerside girl. A Carleton man was fined \$20 and costs for possession of liquor at a place other than his residence. The same fine was levied a Middleton man facing a similar charge. A Summerside man pleaded guilty to 32 offences under the Unemployment Insurance Act. He was charged with drawing insurance cheques while not reporting his earnings from January to August 1958. Evidence revealed the accused had been earning \$53 per month as a janitor. He told the investigating officer he thought he could earn up to \$2 per day without reporting it. He was ordered to pay \$32.50 in fines.

Electric League's Aims Are Outlined At Meeting

SUMMERSIDE — A. D. Cameron, general manager of the Maritime Electric Company, Charlottetown, was the principal speaker at a banquet-meeting of the Electric Service League of P.E.I. held last evening at Mulberry Lodge, Summerside with upwards of 40 members and interested parties present. Chairman of the league, Willard Burke presided. Mr. Burke outlined the aims and objects of the Electric Service League which are mainly to help people to live better electrically. He congratulated Mr. and Mrs. David Morrison and Mr. and Mrs. Horace MacFarlane special head table guests who are the first Red Seal home owners in Summerside. W. R. Brennan, chairman of the standards committee, spoke briefly on Red Seal standards which he said had been under dispute and many expressions of opinion voiced regarding them. However, he stated, after much discussion the same set of standards were adopted in this province which are used across Canada. He stressed that these standards are much higher than the old set although they are little more than adequate in today's modern homes. Mr. Cameron explained the purposes of the league and told of what has been accomplished by it since its inception in 1953. He stressed that it is an association of all members connected with the electrical industry with the object of increasing the standard of electric wiring and education the public in the use and safety of electricity. Mr. Cameron said the league made a good start in 1958 on the program of educating the public outside the industry and stated that this is a field in which "we must look forward to increased activity." The principal speaker said the most spectacular of the league's activities has been the various promotions carried out last year and added that he felt, "there is nothing like a Red Seal home with the Red Seal prominently displayed in front to boost the cause of adequate wiring as well as the reputation of the electrical contractor concerned in the eyes of the public." PROVIDES FIGURES Concerning results, he stated as far as education and promotion are concerned these are intangible, they are hard to measure, but Mr. Cameron provided some figures which showed that during the first 11 months of 1958, with more figures yet to come from Summerside, there has been in the province 132 services increased by 60 ampere capacity or 42 1/2 per cent of the changes compared with 29 per cent in 1957. Mr. Cameron added that during the same period 42 changes to 100 ampere service entrance had been effected, which represents 13 1/2 per cent compared against a little over two per cent in 1957. Mr. Cameron also provided many revealing statistics and concluded by stating that the league is opening a way to wards better living for the public and more abundant use of the magical medium of energy, on which we all depend. "If we as an industry can unite to raise our standards and our sites in supporting the Electric Service League of P.E.I., we cannot fail to participate in the benefits of electrical living in our business." Others who addressed the meeting briefly were Councillor Dr. H. E. Clark, Town Manager J. A. Brophy, A. A. Scales and Mayor W. A. Currie who presented the Red Seal certificates to Mr. MacFarlane and Mr. Morrison. Included among the head table guests were Mayor W. H. Poole, chief electrical inspector, and A. K. Bell, representative of utilities and contractors, Summerside.

Status Of Hospital Sought For Tyne V. Health Centre

SUMMERSIDE—The board of trustees of the Stewart Memorial Health Centre at Tyne Valley will start to make plans for the enlargement of the Health Centre to the full status of a hospital. The trustees were assigned the task at a meeting of the representative of the 21 communities served by the centre held Monday evening in Tyne Valley Hall. The proposal received unanimous support from the 183 representatives who attended to discuss and formulate future operational plans in view of hospital insurance plan which will likely be approved for P.E.I. at this session of the House. The trustees will give a report on their progress and present an estimated cost of the enlargement at a meeting of the 21 communities in Tyne Valley, Feb. 16th. In discussing the report on P.E.I. hospitals the representatives opposed the removal of its chronically ill patients from the community as suggested by the report. It was felt that these patients would be happier and more content to be close to the vicinity in which they had resided and where visits from friends was a simple matter. The representatives decided to send a full report of their resolutions and opinions to the deputy minister of health. The deputy minister is also to be asked procedure to be followed in enlarging the centre to hospital status. The centre is rated at eight beds but it is said to require 10 or more beds for present requirements. The building, in addition to its rooms for patients has also a case room, nursery, kitchen, and staff quarters. It is equipped with an x-ray machine and an oxygen tent.

Presbyterian Church Holds Annual Meeting At Alberton
