

MONTREAL (CP) — Losses ranged to three points at the close today as the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges rolled lower from the opening. Declines out-numbered advances seven to one. Base metals were hard-hit. International Nickel and Aluminum dropped 3 1/2 each. Hudson Bay was off three in the section. The papers International and Great Lakes lost two points while Donohue and St. Lawrence Corporation retreated 1 1/2. Among the steel stocks was off 2 1/2 and Algoma was down 1 1/2. Banks were weak as No. 1 Scotia dropped two points. B.A. slipped a point in the refining oils. Utilities showed Shawinigan off 1 1/2 and Quebec Power down one. Among the miscellaneous issues Industrial Acceptance dropped 3 1/4 as Gypsum and General Dynamics faded two. In the Mines Bouzan, chib jaculet, Merrill Island and Montgarry were lower in a 30-cent range in the mines.

N. Y. STOCKS

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market took its worst beating and on the heaviest volume Monday than at any time since President Eisenhower suffered his intestinal illness June 8. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks dropped \$2.50 to \$172.20, its lowest point since Jan. 23 when it touched the year's low of \$171.60. Volume totalled 2,600,000 shares, largest turnover since 3,600,000 shares were traded in 1929. The fall in the A.P. stock average represented an estimated decline of \$3,000,000,000 in the quoted volume of stocks listed on the New York stock exchange. Pivotal stocks closed with losses running from fractions to around 4 points. But the worst losses were taken in a late afternoon sell-off when prices of the leaders were pounded down as much as 5 points or so. The climactic selling wave was followed by a decided move to the upside which partly offset the losses somewhat and even turned some of them to fractional gains. The recovery toward the close was encouraging to brokers who saw in the big sell-off a possible climax to the general downturn which has prevailed since Egypt nationalized the Suez Canal. Hudson Bay Mining led the losers among Canadian issues on the New York exchange with a drop of 3 1/2. Aluminum Ltd. slipped 3/4 and International Nickel lost 2 1/4. Dome Mines and Granby Mining slipped fractions. Among Canadian issues on the American exchange Shawinigan was off 1 1/2. In mines, Preston East Dome declined 3-1/8. Great Sweet Grass Oil an exception to the downward trend, gained 1-1/8.
