### Former Islander Is Speaker at CCF Rally

The CCF Rally at Kensington on Thursday evening June 24 inst was signally honored in having as the guest speaker, Mr. John MacInnis of Prince George, British Columbia, a native of Hartsville and former M.L.A. in the British Columbia House.

In introducing the distinguished Canadian Empire Games team. Groziuk, a 23-year-old school teacher, equalled the meet record for the 40-yard hurdles Saturday, winning in 58.8 seconds and establishing himself as a definite games team contender.

Miss Hobbins, 16, won the women's 80-metre hurdles, breaking the meet record of 12.1 seconds by 1-10 of a second. Her time equalled the standard set for BE Games runners.

### Two Canadian Track And Field Records Fall

TORONTO (CP)—Two Canadian field records fell at the Canadian open track and field championships here during the week-end, but track marks stood despite attempts by some of the continent's best runners. Hot, humid weather kept crowds Friday night and Saturday to about 250.

Roy Pella, 23, of Sudbury, Ont., a football prospect and graduate of the University of Michigan this spring, broke the Canadian native discus record with a throw of 160 feet, nine inches Saturday. He passed the old mark by 3 1/2 feet.

In the he-man hammer throw, U.S. record holder Martin Engles of Long Island, N.Y., cracked a 43-year-old Canadian open record with a heave of 190 feet, 11 inches, just 4 1/2 feet short of his American mark, and eight feet, seven inches better than the previous Canadian standard set in 1911 by M. J. McGrath of New York City.

Pella, Murray Groziuk of Hamilton and Gwen Hobbins and Jackie MacDonald, both of Toronto, led the Canadians, with performances that could lead to a berth on the

he said "believes in gradual change to meet changing conditions in accordance with democratic principles" and predicted that socialism will come when the people are ready for it. He cited the Scandinavian countries as examples of democratic socialism in action and also as examples of the best in good government.

He gave high praise to the Co-

op movement, Credit Unions and all forms of adult education that teaches the people to help themselves and help in keeping purchasing power and credit in the hands of the common people.

At the close of his address Mr. MacInnis conducted a question and answer period which opened up some very interesting topics. In moving a vote of thanks, Mr. Irving Toombs paid tribute to Mr.

MacInnis for unselfishly giving of his time and effort, during his short vacation, to the cause so close to his heart. In support of the nation, Mr. Murdoch MacLeod, Mr. J. W. Hows and Mr. Douglas MacFarlane expressed appreciation and thanks to Mr. MacInnis for his address. Mr. C. F. Gallant, C.C.F. Provincial President chaired the meeting which was well attended.
