Public Meeting at Campbellton.

A large meeting of the residents of Lot 4 and 7 was held at Campbellton on Monday, April 7th, Mr. Peter Doyle in the chair, and N. S. J. Murray secretary. The object of the meeting was to consider the exhibition question and petition Parliament to hold the Prince County Fair every other year at Alberton. Speeches were made by Messrs J. McCarthy, James Gorman, John McDougall, James Dalton and Rev. A. E. Burke, and the following resolution, moved by Mr. John Doyle, and seconded by Mr. Daniel O'Sullivan, was unanimously carried.

Whereas, The people of western Prince County derive no benefit whatever from the County Exhibitions as now held at Summerside, owing to the great distance over which they would be obliged to travel to attend them, and the heavy expenses necessitated, and Whereas, These money grants for Exhibitions are made for the whole County, and to encourage farmers and stock raisers to better efforts, and Whereas, This part of the County requires, perhaps more so than any other, all the encouragement possible on account of the backward condition of agriculture, etc., be it therefore Resolved, That we hereby call upon the Government to consider our interests by causing to be held in Alberton every other year the County Fair, and by disposing thereof in our joint share of Stock Farm animals.

In conformity with the resolution petitions were immediately circulated and largely signed for transmission to the Government.
