shows bent, and fingertips touching in front of chest. With a sudden thrust movement, push fingertips together--relax and repeat the thrust movement for a dozen counts or so.

Follow with this controlled exercise movement. Raise left arm sideways at shoulder level. Place palm of right hand on left side of chest with fingertips touching left collar bone so as to feel the muscle action. The technique is to force the muscle under the right hand to take the action as you slowly move left arm toward center. Keep the arm straight, relaxed completely and at shoulder level. Repeat with other arm, and again make sure the pectoral muscle does the work.
