Thousands of Lobsters Seized in West Prince

Fisheries protection officers have seized thousands of short lobsters in the West Prince County area during an intense crackdown in the past few days, reports reaching The Guardian-Prince yesterday indicate.

While the protection branch has been kept busy since the lobster season opened in the area, recent activity has come up to the list when he stopped lobstersters and two others each carrying 300 short lobsters seized, a source close to the protection branch said.

Ground Water Level Survey Is Scheduled For Province

Another geologist has arrived in the province and will spend at least a month carrying out work in connection with a ground water resources survey of the province.

Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossiter said yesterday that Dr. Leo V. Brandon, a federal department of mines and technical survey geologist with work in the eastern part of the province and will have his headquarters in Moncton.

The ground water survey began several years ago in the O'Leary and Tignish areas. Included in Dr. Brandon's program of work will be visits to other parts of the province.

Dr. Brandon will be assisted in parts of his work by Graham Rogers, provincial geologist, chief officer, and Frank Gaudet, provincial forester.

Parkdale Man Is Fined \$25 On Stolen Goods Possession

Convicted on the charge of possession of stolen goods, William M. Kennedy, Parkdale, was fined \$25 and costs or 10 days in jail, by Magistrate A.J. Haslam in city police court yesterday.

Kennedy, who was counselled by Lester P. O'Donnell, was charged with having possession of a Pioneer chain saw, valued at \$115, the property of Holman's Hardware, N.B., president of the Pioneer chain saw company, secured by an indictable offence.

By consent of the defence, Kennedy was released on \$25 bail. Magistrate O'Donnell, Chief of Police C.W. MacArthur, and N.B. president Maynard Cadogan, Charlottetown, were remanded until June 29.

Cadogan, at an earlier hearing elected trial by judge and jury, on the charge of possession of money to the amount of \$50, the property of Cadogan, N.B., president of Edward Barrett Jr., Charlottetown, was further remanded until June 29, on a charge of being drunk and disorderly.

Of four persons charged with being drunk and disorderly, in which they all pleaded guilty, one was sentenced to 30 days in jail, another was given a 30-day suspended sentence, another was fined \$30 and costs or 10 days in jail, and the fourth 10 and costs or five days.
