## Committee To Negotiate Potato Crop Failure Aid

Crop failure assistance on a basis of \$50 per acre up to a maximum of 15 acres was considered yesterday afternoon by over 500 potato growers at a federation of Agriculture sponsored meeting in O'Leary Regional High School auditorium in resolution to this effect failed to win approval and it was finally decided to appoint a steering committee which is to use the resolution as a basis for negotiation for assistance from the federal and provincial governments.

Two crop failures in Prince County by reason of drought and low market price this year were the principal reasons given for the request for assistance. Many farmers present referred to West Prince as a disaster or distressed area and were unable to see how they could carry on without assistance of some kind.

A Montrose farmer, Raymond Hardy, said he had two of the poorest crops of potatoes he ever grew and all other crops suffered from drought. "The large attendance at the meeting proved that something is wrong," he said, "and expressing the opinion that children are going hungry owing to depressed conditions."

Lester Wallace, Caspeucup, said that farmers depend on potatoes as the life cash crop in the area for tractors and other machinery also automobiles. "In 1959, I paid \$125 for a potato crop, today they are closer to a thousand," Mr. Wallace stated. "After last year when we had a flourishing potato crop from 90 to 150 bushels an acre is a calamity," Mr. Wallace concluded.

Arnold Wood, West Cape, also referred to the present situation as a disaster and suggested potatoes come under price support for distressed agricultural products. "We were given no insurance by Mr. Diefenbaker two years ago that potatoes would be under price support," continued Mr. Wood, and the present administration is doing nothing to help the growers this year."
