IRISH NEWS.

Confession from the Assassins.

Heavy Fires in Leadville.

Special Despatch to the Examiner.

LONDON, May 19.

Mr. Holden, the Liberal candidate for the seat in the Commons for the northern division of the West Riding of Yorkshire, made vacant by the murder of Lord Cavendish, has been elected by a vote of 9,892, against 7,865 for Hon. Charles Gathorne Hardy, Conservative candidate.

The Globe announces that the Queen has conferred a baronetcy on the Right Hon. J. Whitaker Ellis, Lord Mayor of London. The peer at Queensborough, and a brigantine alongside has been totally burned.

A large fire at Lyons has destroyed a number of workshops and other buildings. Loss £160,000.

DUBLIN, May 19.

The Freeman's Journal published a long story anonymously sent, and bearing a London postmark, professing to be a confession of one of the assassins, it intimates that the crime was conceived as an answer to the appointment of Lord Frederick Cavendish, by the Irish Assassination Society, having branches throughout the Kingdom. Over twenty persons are said to be implicated in the crime, all of whom have now escaped to England. The writer says they attended the funerals of their victims. The story has created a sensation but is considered a hoax.

LEADVILLE, COL., May 19.

A fire, this afternoon, burned nearly a block, including many prominent business houses. Loss, \$200,000. Two dead bodies have been recovered from the ruins, and it is feared that others will be found.
