Accused Remanded On Negligence Charge

A relatively heavy docket was heard by Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queens County Magistrate's Court yesterday.

A West Royalty man, Alexander Walsh Rhynes, charged with selling liquor was remanded to Nov. 22 with bail to stand. The accused was represented by Lester O'Donnell.

Bertram Joseph Kelly, North Rustico, charged with assault had his case adjourned to Nov. 23 for trial. He is represented by Gordon Tweedy.

John Wallace MacNeil, Milton, charged with driving while his license was suspended, had his case adjourned to Nov. 17. He was represented by John Nicholson.

A fine of \$50 and costs or 30 days was imposed on Ralph James Corbett of Rocky Point on a charge of theft (less than \$50).

Sterling Sheldon MacNevin of Canoe Cove was fined \$14 and costs or five days on a charge of hunting without a licence. A Cornwall man, John Char-

les Hyde, was fined \$15 and costs on a charge of making a left turn on the highway when it was not safe to do so and \$20 and costs on a charge of causing a disturbance in a public dance hall by fighting.

Donald Joseph Noonan of Borden, charged with criminal negligence in the operation of a vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor at an excessive rate of speed on the left side of the highway showing a reckless or wanton disregard for the safety of others, was remanded to Nov. 17 with bail to stand. Lester O'Donnell is counsel for the accused.

Douglas Joseph Strickland Marshfield, and Barry Joseph Gass, city were each remanded on two charges of break, entry and theft to Nov. 17 to fix a date for trial. George Tweedy is counsel for the accused.

Two persons were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days on charges of illegal possession of liquor.

Board Blitz Said Success

Charlottetown Board of Trade general manager Eric Kipping said last night that the board's "blitz" for new membership was "a fine success."

About 25 board members, under the chairmanship of W.J. Hancock, carried out the membership drive yesterday.

Mr. Kipping said the "blitz" resulted in 103 new and renewed memberships with 36 prospective members promised and probable. He said board membership now stands at 273 which is 10 more than a year ago. He added that the "probable membership of the board will be 309 which is the highest it has ever been."

Ferries Carry Half Million

BORDEN — Traffic between Prince Edward Island and the mainland on Canadian National ferries continue to increase during October. Bringing the total number of passengers carried so far this year to 559,785 — an increase of 73,500 over the first 10 months of 1964.

During October, CNS-Borden-Cape Tormentine ferry service carried 5,276 more passengers and 1,190 more vehicles than during the same month last year.

Passenger traffic in October, 1965, totalled 43,959 with vehicular traffic amounting to 16,707. The "Abegweit" and "Confederation" made 697 passenger-carrying trips during the month, as well as non-scheduled gas and freight crossings.

This winter, Canadian National will operate the most frequent winter ferry schedule ever for Prince Edward Island. With two ships operating, a total of 20 crossings a day, the service will be twice as frequent as last winter.

Davis, manager of CNS Maritime area, shows 15,036 automobiles carried across the Strait, 2,106 trucks, 1,243 tractor trailers, six motorcycles, 87 passenger trailers and 209 buses. CNS charter bus carried 1,742 passengers. The charter bus service connecting with CN main-line trains, previously operated only in summer months, is now being run on a year-round basis.

It was decided that Summerside stores will be open on Saturday afternoons from Nov. 27 to Dec. 18. Stores will also be open every night from Dec. 16 to the 23rd, except Sunday, but including the night of Saturday, Dec. 18.

Since Boxing Day falls on Sunday, stores will be closed on Monday, Dec. 27. They will be open Thursday night, Dec. 30, but closed Friday, New Year's Eve, Dec. 31, at 5:00 p.m. They will re-open Monday, Jan. 3.

Accused With Incest, Trial By Judge Chosen

SUMMERSIDE — A Lennox Island man, Peter Frank Labobe, elected trial before a judge without a jury when he appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County court yesterday on a charge of incest.

The date for preliminary hearing was set to Nov. 18 and bail was set at \$1,000 in two sureties of \$500 each.

Arnold John Lord of Central Bedouque appeared on a charge of failing to surrender his license when it was suspended and his case was adjourned to Nov. 25 for trial.

Emmanuel Stanislas Gallant of Summerside entered a not guilty plea to a charge of unlawful sale of liquor and his case was adjourned to Nov. 16 for a trial date to be set.

A plea of not guilty was entered by John Joseph Gaudet on a charge of driving without due care and attention and his case was adjourned to Dec. 9. George Howard Wood of North Tryon and Harry Lloyd Millar of Kensington were each fined \$10 and costs on separate charges of passing on solid white lines.

A Northam man, Lloyd Edson Ramsay, was fined \$10 for driving a vehicle which was in a dangerous condition.

The firm of Williams and Inman Ltd. of Ellerslie, was fined a similar amount for operating a vehicle which was not properly equipped.

James Kennedy of Summerside and Gordon Garth Mayhew of Tryon pleaded not guilty to separate charges of speeding. The Kennedy case was adjourned to Dec. 2 while Mayhew's case was adjourned to Nov. 16 for trial.

For failing to halt at a stop sign, Wesley James MacDonald, Wellington, was fined \$10 and costs.

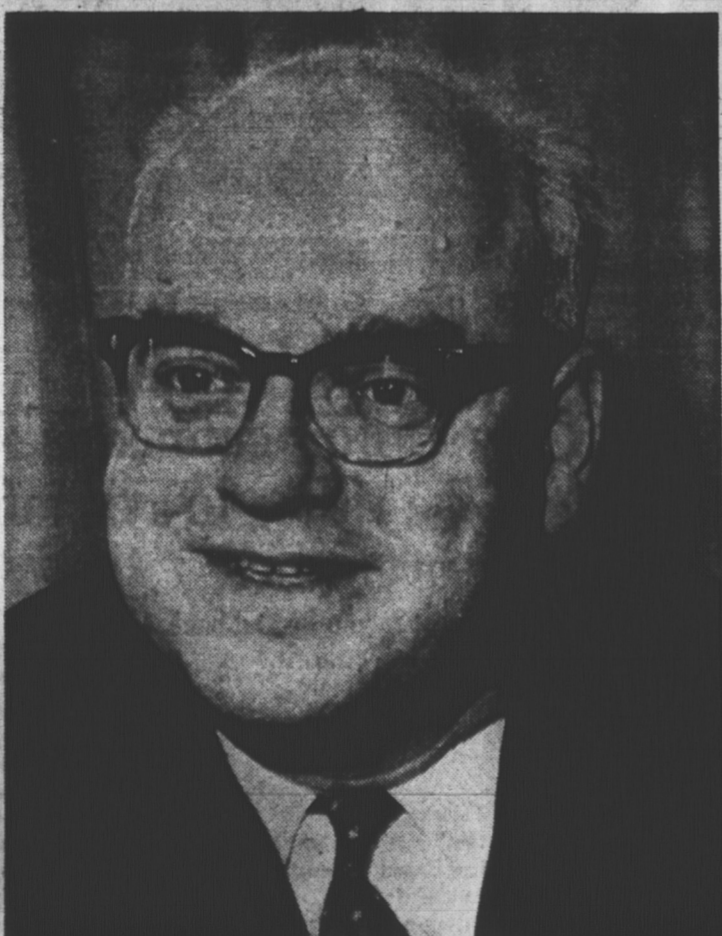
