FOR NEWFOUNDLAND.—The schooner Soudan leaves this afternoon for St. John's, Newfoundland, loaded with sixty-two head of cattle, eleven of which were fed by Richard C. Bagnall, Esq., of New Glasgow Mills, ten by the Dockendorff brothers, and the others by Messrs. McCallum and Gregor of Brackley Point, and Messrs. Murphy, Dickieson and McMillen, of West River,—and sixty sheep shipped by Mr. Barratt Henderson. Success to the Soudan and her cargo.

FIRE.—We are sorry to hear that the residence of Joseph Dunn, at Fairville, Lot 49, was burnt down on the night of Tuesday, April 19th. The fire was well under way before it was discovered, and Mr. Dunn had barely time to escape from the burning building. All the furniture was destroyed, together with a quantity of potatoes in the cellar, nothing being saved except a few articles of wearing apparel which Mr. Dunn took with him. From the residence the fire spread to a barrack of straw, which was soon a mass of flames. It then spread further to a quantity of threshed straw scattered around the barrack, and these buildings also caught and were quickly burnt to the ground. It was only by a desperate fight with the fire that Mr. Dunn was able to save his stock from the burning buildings. A quantity of oats and hay, however, were also burnt. There is a small insurance on the buildings, but not near enough to cover the loss, which to Mr. Dunn is a very serious one.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The Trade Returns for March.

OTTAWA, April 23.

The trade returns for March are of a favorable character. The exports show an increase of \$722,000 and the imports increased during March \$1,648,000.

Western Notes.

He speaks in glowing terms of the way business is done in Boston, and is most favorably impressed with the new firm of Woodside & Co., Boston, who do a big Island trade, as both members of the firm lately were our citizens, viz.: Neil Woodside and Alex. McLeod.

The usual quiet has settled down upon our small town after the meeting of the Grand Division. Judging from the appearance of things here on Friday night, all who came on train and other conveyance did not belong to the Grand or any other division unless it was the rumblers division.

Some of our citizens think that the Rev. Mr. Bell in his address at the meeting of the Grand Division (as the saying goes) put his foot in it and made some very uncalculated and not very complimentary remarks about other local temperance societies, not perhaps in communion with the Grand Division.

Several vessels have cleared from this port for fishing and trading, about 8 we are informed up to date, four fishing and four coasting. Owing to the great dullness in the sale of our produce in the neighboring markets of the other provinces very little oats and potatoes are moving.

Almost all our oats are being bought by Messrs. J. W. Richards & Co., for the English market. Hon. Mr. Rogers will as usual ship one or two spring cargoes to the West Indies in a few days. NEMO.
