Dear Mary Howarth: If Mrs. G. R. lives in Manhattan, a she should apply to the Metropolitan Hospital for help for her son who is a drug addict. There is a waiting list, but once he is admitted he will have the best psychiatric care.

The parents will be consulted, separately and together, to give a true picture of the boy's background. And there is nothing to fear, as it is very confidential and nothing is written who you talk.

On the average in turn will be told everything about dope and made to realize that nobody, special included, can guarantee a cure—where a great sorrow of the psychiatric staff at Georgetown University in Washington, D.C. affiliated with the medical school and hospital of the same name will accept strictly grave cases. My friend says the crux-question is: "Is it urgent?" If satisfied that it is, the staff will do anything to help. - E. S.

An outstanding speaker is a member of the clergy who works directly with addicts, trying to get them the necessary hospital and specialist treatment. We were advised to write to U.C.A., P.O. Box 4097, Sunnyside 4, Long Island, New York, for full details.

I feel sure that a letter from Mrs. G. R. to the above address will get her son, a drug addict, the help she so desperately wants. - V.B.
