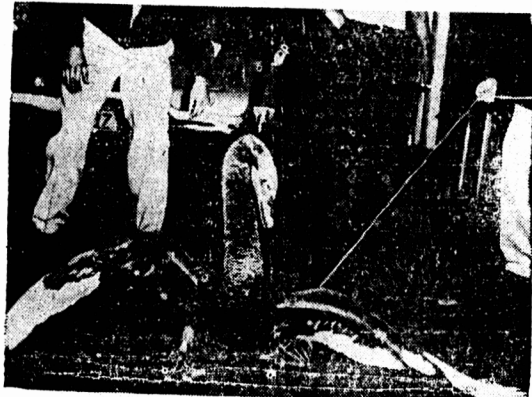

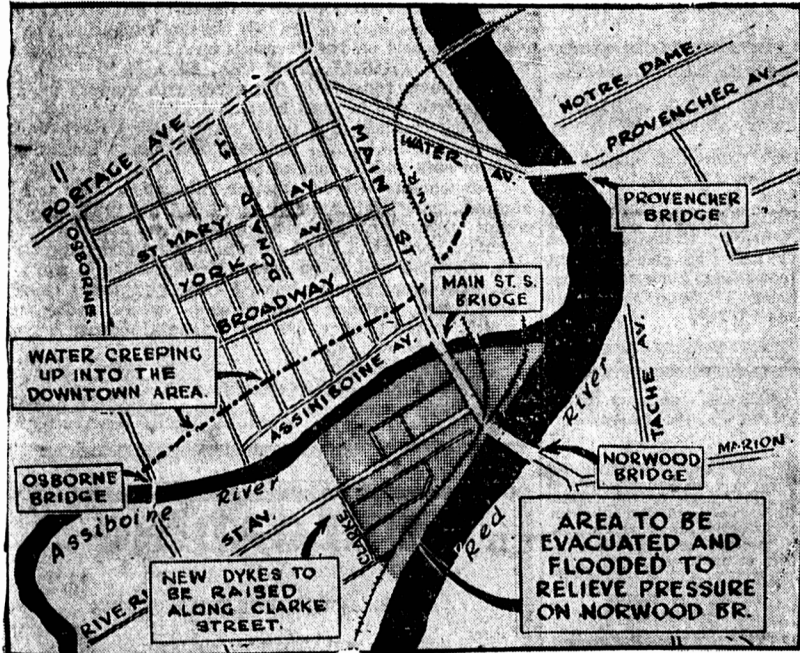


Two evacuations are under way in flood-damaged Winnipeg, one into city and an even more staggering movement-out. Hundreds are stopping only long enough to be clothed and fed, then with other refugees they're being loaded on trains and buses in a mass removal to other communities beyond the flood zone and points further east. Held in check for the past few days, the fast-moving waters of the swollen Red river broke through the East Kildonan dykes covering residential community with 12 feet of water and posing a new threat for a city fighting for its existence.

This dog and his master, from St. Vital, Winnipeg suburb, were among hundreds of evacuees who arrived in Toronto, on Thursday, seeking escape from Winnipeg, which has been described as a "city besieged in wartime." Hundreds more are expected as close to 200 empty passenger cars are en route from Montreal to Winnipeg to transport residents to safer areas. The cars, shipped by the C.N.R. and C.P.R., started to roll westward after army headquarters in Winnipeg requested rail transportation for refugees.

Newest area evacuated is shown on this map. 500 to 600 families are affected in the scramble. It includes total of 10 city blocks and an estimated higher ground.



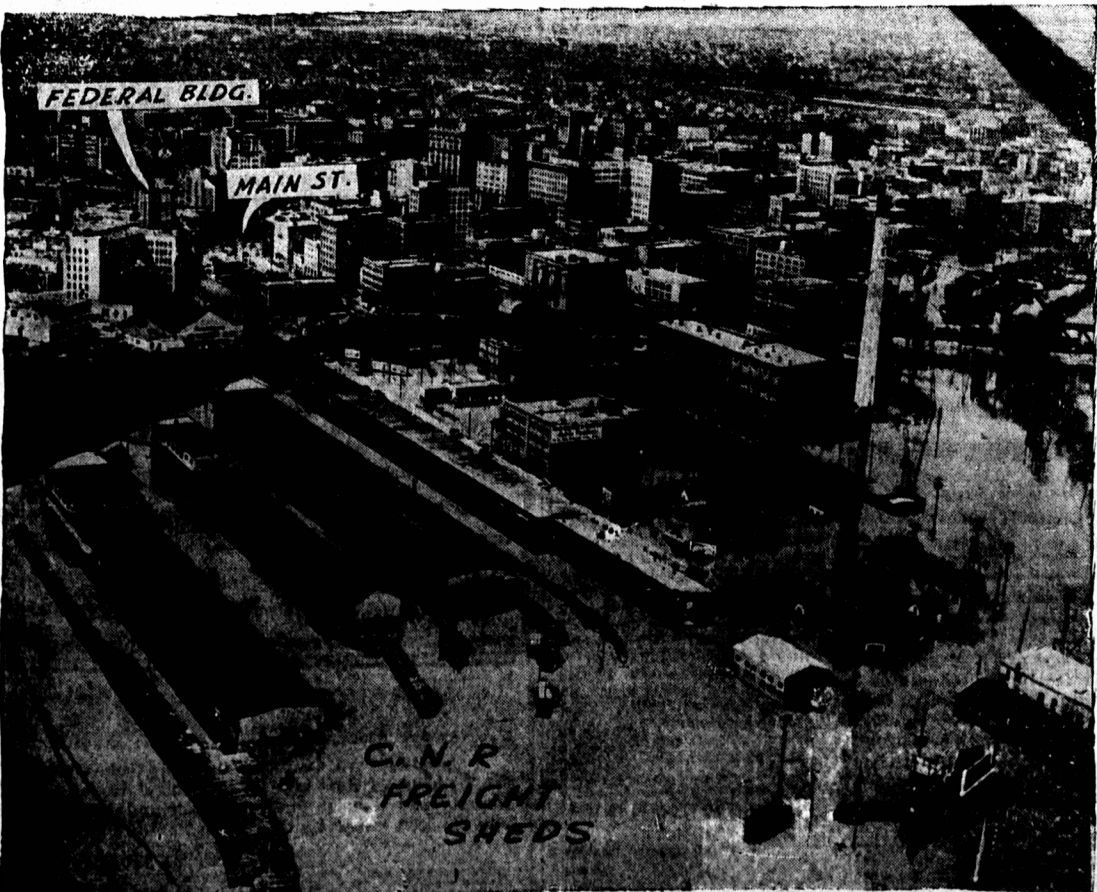
Lieut.-Col. Agnes C. Neill, of Toronto, former matron-in-chief of the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps overseas, died suddenly at her home in Peterboro, Ont., At the time of her death she was Ontario Area Nursing consultant for the Veterans' Affairs department, D.V.A. She had co-ordinated nursing services in three D.V.A. provincial districts at Kingston, London, and Toronto.



Chancellor Konrad Adenauer of West Germany, was forced to call the German cabinet into an emergency session meeting at Bonn, to discuss the Moscow announcement that Russia has completed repatriation of all German prisoners of war. The announcement, made by the official Soviet news agency, Tass, added that since Germany's surrender in 1945, the Soviet Union has repatriated 1,939,163 prisoners including 58,103 discovered in 1947-49 among prisoners of other nationalities in the Soviet Union. According to German officers' announcement, which was "termed unbelievable" mean that there were still 400,000 prisoners left in Russia.
