### Legion Home Tenders To Be Aided August

Tenders for the construction of Charlotte's new Royal Canadian Legion home are expected to be called by late August, it was revealed at last night's regular monthly meeting of the branch in the Legion Home on Grafton Street. The new building is to be built on Porsell Street between Richmond and Grafton Streets.

The main highlight of the meeting was the presentation of the highest award the Royal Canadian Legion can bestow. The award, the Meritorious Service Medal, was presented to Philip E. Palmer of Charlotte by Group Captain Ronald Stewart, Ottawa, Dominion honorary treasurer.

A citation accompanying the medal was read by Group Capt. Stewart and stated "The award is made in recognition of your loyal, faithful and devoted service — your dedicated service to your comrades of the Charlotte (P.E.I. No. 1) branch of the Royal Canadian Legion, and before that of the Great War Veterans' Association, all done."

"Your kindness of heart, your abounding goodwill, your wise counsel and sound advice, your fine example and your careful and thoughtful companionship have been a great help to you as 'Mr. Legion'."

"We are therefore happy to ask you to accept this Meritorious Service Medal as a symbol of our warm regard and lasting affection."

Group Capt. Stewart spoke to the members on the history of the Great War Veterans' Association and the formation of the Charlotte branch of the Legion.

He recalled that in order to stimulate public interest in a First World War memorial the members had a small wooden cross made up at placed immediately in front of the South African Memorial.

"In due course the very impressive three figure memorial was erected to commemorate the years 1914-1918. In view of the addition of 1939-1945 figures thereby making it a memorial of our World War, one is given to wonder how it is that the dates 1914-1918 were not on the South African Memorial."

**NOT REPRESENTATIVE**

"Obviously the three figures at the head of Great George Street do not in any manner represent those who served and died during the Second World War," he said.

Group Capt. Stewart said he hoped that someday there would be placed between the memorial and the provincial building a cross of sacrifice, similar to those in war cemeteries under the control of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. Such a cross, he said, would be a provincial memorial. He said the cross would not cost more than 100,000 and in no matter would be dated by passing years.

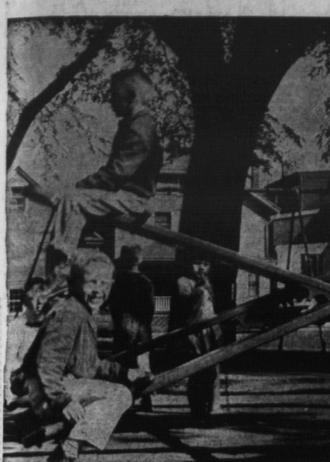

### East Royalty Man Testifies In Own Defence On Charge

With the exception of the summons by defence counsel and the Crown prosecutor, the case of Wynand VanWestering, East Royalty, charged with failing to stop when signalled to do so by a police officer, was completed in Queens County magistrate's court yesterday before Justice of the Peace Alford Dibb. The accused was remanded until today to fix a date for the next hearing. Another charge against Mr. VanWestering, that of speeding, was also over until today.

During yesterday's hearing, two witnesses were heard for the Crown, Cret. John Norton, of the Sherwood Village Police, and Fred Cannon, chairman of the Sherwood Village Commissioners. The accused was the only witness called by the defence.

Const. Norton testified that on June 16 at approximately 6:30 p.m. he was standing with Mr. Cannon on Mr. Cannon's lawn when his attention was drawn to a vehicle travelling in a southerly direction on the Brockley Point Road. He said he was first attracted by the noise of the vehicle.

He said the vehicle was a large truck and he believed it was travelling at an excessive rate of speed. He stated that he ran to the west side of the highway and signalled to the driver of the vehicle to stop.

**GAVE CHASE**

Const. Norton said he signalled until the truck passed him and he then ran to the police car and gave chase. He said he followed the vehicle for several tenths of a mile and had a red flasher and siren going for part of the distance. He said the driver stated, after he was stopped, that he did not see Const. Norton signal him to stop previously.

Const. Norton noted that in order to catch the accused he had to travel at the rate of 53 m.p.h. and that the speed limit in the village was 30 m.p.h.

Mr. VanWestering testified that he never saw the police officer in front of Mr. Cannon's house nor anyone else. He said he first saw Const. Norton in the mirror following him and that he stopped his truck when he heard the siren of the police car.

**EXACTLY 30**

The accused stated that he was driving exactly 30 m.p.h. when Const. Norton came up behind him. He said he had been convicted three times previously under the Highway Traffic Act and that he had about three points left. He said driving a truck was his livelihood. Mr. VanWestering stated that he could not have been doing 53 m.p.h. as Const. Norton stated because his truck could never have made the airport hill at that rate of speed.

He said that later that night he was followed home by the RCMP who told him to get his windshield fixed as it was cracked so badly that they believed he could not see through it.

J.P. Nicholson was the defence counsel while Alan Scates appeared for the Crown.

### 4 Remanded For Sentence

Four cases of possession of stolen goods were completed in city police court yesterday, and all four accused were then remanded for sentence until June 29 by Magistrate A.J. Haslam.

The four accused, Maurice Williams, Peter Hughes, Robert Weeks and Gilmer Doucette, all of Charlotteville, are charged with having possession of one overcoat, one raincoat, one travel kit, one sample case complete with samples, known to have been obtained by the commission of an indictable offence.

On the charge of uttering a forged document, a government cheque, Harold Arsenault, Charlotteville, committed by Gilbert A. Gaudet, was further remanded until July 5.

Pleading guilty to speeding at 23 m.p.h. east on Easton Street, Kenneth F. MacDonald, Spruce Line Road, was fined \$15 and cost five days in jail.

A lone drunk and incapable was sentenced to 20 days in Queens County Jail.

### UN Approves Independence For Two Nations

UNITED NATIONS (CP) — The UN General Assembly has overwhelmingly approved independence for two more African nations effective next Sunday.

They are the Republic of Burundi, carved from the Belgian trust territory of Ruanda-Urundi.

The vote on a resolution framed by the assembly's trusteeship committee in marathon sessions Tuesday was 82-0 with 19 abstentions.

The assembly defeated 48-0, 20-0 a resolution of similar amendment demanding that the Belgians withdraw all their troops by midnight next Saturday. The Soviet bloc abstained in the final voting. Cuba decried the Soviet bloc and voted with the majority.

### TRY TO BOOTHE BOVINY MOSCOW (AP) — Austrian Chancellor Alois Gorbach arrived Thursday for a 19-day visit and talks with Premier Khrushchev aimed at settling Soviet opposition to neutral Austria's plans to link up with the West European Common Market. ### School Zones Revised For Grades One To Six

New zoning regulations for city children attending elementary schools, grades 1-6, were announced yesterday from the office of K. A. Parker, superintendent of city schools. In making the announcement, Mr. Parker asked the fullest cooperation of parents affected by boundary changes.

"There can be no exceptions from this trial period of one year," he emphasized.

West Kent school, grades 1-4, will be attended by pupils west of Queen Street both sides, and north to Interkenan on both sides.

Spring Park school, grades 1-6, will take all boys and girls north of Interkenan Lane and North of Eden Street on both sides.

Prince Street school, grades 1-6, will take all others east of Queen Street and South of Eden Street.

Rochford Square pupils, grades 1-6, will take all boys and girls on 1 and 2 South of Euston Street, but not on Euston Street, and East of Elm Avenue, but not on Elm Avenue and all girls on Eden Street 1-6 in the same area.

St. Jean School, grades 1-4, will accommodate all boys and girls in the above area.
