Canucks Grab Two Medals But U.S. Still Dominates

SAO PAULO, Brazil (CP-AP)—Canadian players grabbed two bronze medals in swimming Friday night but the United States continued its domination of the fourth Pan-American Games. The U.S. team boasted its gold medal haul to 38 with two more victories in swimming—11 now has 10 gold medals in 11 events—two in shooting and one in fencing. Sandy Gilchrist, a 19-year-old high school student from Ocean Falls, B.C., and the men's 400-metre medley relay team were the third-place finishers for Canada. Gilchrist finished behind Roy Searl and Don Schollander of the U.S. in the men's 400-metre freestyle and Ralph Hutton, also from the tiny pulp-and-paper town on British Columbia's coast, finished fourth. The U.S. team finished in a games record time of 4:05.8, well under the 1959 mark of 4:12.8.
