Editorial Notes.

Those who were dubious that the Government would not distribute the fishing bounty money, will be reassured by the news which comes from Ottawa that steps will at once be taken to find out all who are entitled to the bounty, and to pay over the money.

The not very prosperous shipping interests of the United States are receiving attention from Congress; and the following proposition has been adopted by the Shipping Committee:

Whenever vessels, steam or sail, shall be constructed and equipped in the United States for foreign trade, including trade between Atlantic and Pacific ports of the United States, in whole or in part of materials of the production of the United States, the owners of such vessels shall be entitled to receive from the United States a sum equal to the duty which would be collected upon imported materials of like description and of equal quality with American materials used in the construction, equipments, engines, boilers, and other appurtenances of such vessels. It is estimated that upon an iron ship of four thousand tons the bonus would amount to \$50,000. A proposition was also adopted that "all registered vessels, sail or steam, of the United States, engaged exclusively in the foreign carrying trade are hereby exempted from all or any State or municipal taxation. A proposition for free ships offered by Mr. Cox was rejected.

It is believed that if the bill becomes law it will enable American shipbuilders to compete successfully with the shipbuilders of the Clyde or elsewhere.

The Montreal Gazette, the leading financial and commercial paper of Canada, has an article in which speaking of the "general outlook" it says:

There are indications, that the inflow of foreign capital will shortly begin on a scale of some magnitude. The Government will not be a borrower abroad for some years. It is true it will continue to remit interest on the public debt from this country, and to redeem its bonds from time to time, and little relief to the exchange market need be expected from this source. But the Canadian Pacific Railway Company will hereafter derive little of its capital from Canada. The new stock recently created when placed will be put on a foreign market; land purchases hereafter will be mainly by immigrants; the Government subsidy earned in no year to come can be so large as that of the year now closing, and the whole of the land bonds have now been disposed of. It is perfectly safe, therefore, to count upon the future expenditure upon the Pacific railway being made from capital obtained abroad, and in respect to this one enterprise alone the substitution of foreign for Canadian capital will exert an important influence for good upon all branches of commerce. It only requires the exercise of prudence on the part of importers and manufacturers so as not to over-stock the market to avert all danger of a reaction from the splendid prosperity of the past three years.

- The Earl of Derby may strengthen the ministry. For the present, at least, his accession seems to please public opinion. But he is not a good party-man. Even Beaconsfield couldn't manage him; and it is just possible that when the pinch comes, and come it must, the Earl of Derby will not be found en rapport with his more radical colleagues. If when he changed his political coat he were a younger man it might be possible for him to overcome his Conservative habits of mind. But it is too late now.

The brigantine "Corinne" was towed into Pictou by the "Northern Light" on Saturday, for repairs. She was on passage from Montreal to St. John's, Newfoundland, and called into this port for a quantity of pork and lard which was shipped by Owen Connolly, Esq. She sailed from here on Sunday, the 10th, and laid at anchor at Malignant Cove, Antigonish Cove. The storm becoming severe on the 14th, the captain was obliged to cut away the masts to prevent her from going ashore. She will receive masts in Pictou and proceed to her destination.

The fishing season being over the Department of Marine and Fisheries will immediately send to all fishery officers in the Maritime Provinces blank forms of applications for fishing bounty, on the basis of two dollars per ton up to eighty tons, for vessels, to be divided equally between vessel and crew; and to boats two dollars and fifty cents for each man employed three months in sea fishing and taking not less than twenty-five hundred pounds of sea fish, other than those exempted by the Washington Treaty.

Six young bloods of Summerside were arraigned before the Stipendiary Magistrate on Saturday for fast driving. The complaint was made by a gentleman resident of the town who, at the trial, spoke strongly against the danger of fast driving through the public streets. Five of the "bloods" were fined \$3 with court expenses, and the sixth was dismissed because his horse was not steady enough to be taken into the street.

A large quantity of cargo must have washed out and gone to sea. It is thought another heavy gale will completely destroy the ship."
