

# Provincial Employees Seek Bargaining Rights

The P.E.I. Public Servants Association will back a request to the provincial government for a meeting early next year to discuss bargaining rights for civil servants.

A campaign for such a meeting will be carried out by the Canadian Federation of Government Employees Organizations, of which the P.E.I. Association is a member.

Provincial association president J.V. MacIntyre, who is returning from the annual federation meeting in Victoria, B.C. said yesterday that "the federation agreed on the principle of collective bargaining and binding arbitration."

"At present, Saskatchewan provincial employees are the only ones in the country with the rights of collective bargaining and arbitration, which includes the right to strike."

**EXTENSIVE CAMPAIGN**

"The national federation intends to wage an extensive campaign this year to set up a 'little royal commission' to study the matter."

"Premiers of seven provinces — Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia, will be asked to delegate a cabinet minister and civil service chair to the meeting."

Ontario, Quebec and Newfoundland, at present, are not members of the federation.

"At the proposed meeting," said Mr. MacIntyre, "the federation intends to point out that unless such rights as collective bargaining and binding arbitration are granted, elevating civil servants from their present 'inferior' status, labor unions will move in to organize government employees."

"Unless these rights are granted, the federation claims civil service organizations will splinter into a multitude of organizations and associations in the various governments, becoming fair game to organizers of labor unions. If this splintering takes place it will definitely be to the detriment of all concerned."

According to Mr. MacIntyre, some of the things the "little royal commission" he refers to would examine would be the "friends and efforts of unions to organize civil servants — whether or not this is a desirable thing, and if not, what the alternatives may be."

Accompanying Mr. MacIntyre to the provincial meeting was Dr. James Higgins, vice-president of the Victoria Association.

Many of the resolutions already submitted deal with money matters—pay rates for various classifications, overtime, hours of work, superannuation, holidays with pay. Others are expected from the floor.

# Austerity Program Results In Fitness Grant Reduction

With a cutback to \$1,000,000 from \$5,000,000 in the current fiscal year, by the federal government, in money for the promotion of physical fitness and amateur sports in Canada this year, the province will receive about half of what was expected when the grant was announced last winter.

When the federal program was announced, this province was to get a grant of \$50,000 and 10 cents per capita, making its share approximately \$60,000.

**NEW FORMULA USED**

At a weekend meeting in Ottawa, Health Minister Monteth announced that a new formula would be used. Each province in this fiscal year, will get two grants of \$15,000 each, plus a per capita grant in each case, making this province's total \$30,000.

Provincial director of physical education, David Boswell, said yesterday P.E.I. Island has already received the first \$15,000, which was used for planning and organization of a physical fitness program. As soon as an agreement is signed with Ottawa, expected shortly, the province will receive another \$15,000 for approved projects.
