Accompany them will be Maine's Blueberry Queen, who will ride in the Gold Cup and Sauter Parade in a white convertible brought here for the occasion.

Mayor Gaudet, Deputy Mayor Walter Cox, City Comptroller John Butler, and councillors W. R. MacNeil and Arthur Wright attended the Ellsworth bi-centennial celebrations last July with the 1963 City of Charlottetown float.

Councillors To Ottawa For Enheat

Councillors John P. Nicholson and Allison M. Gillis will meet with Defence Minister C. M. Dyrny in Ottawa within the next few days to plead the city's case in the proposed shutdown of Enheat and Heating Company's Charlottetown plant.

Council met in emergency session yesterday at noon to discuss the visit. The resolution asking that the two councillors be granted the necessary expenses was passed unanimously.

Closure of the Charlottetown plant would put some 55 employees off the Enheat payroll here. A large majority of these are city residents.

Part of the terms of reference to be used by Councillors Nicholson and Gillis will be to seek other types of work for which the plant can be readily converted.

The two councillors are expected to meet tomorrow with representatives of Enheat for a briefing on the subject before leaving for Ottawa.

Second SDU History Talk Is Tonight

New High School Superintendent Appointed Here

Attending a teaching mission in Liberia, West Africa, during the summer of 1963, was one of the self-admitted highlights of the educational career of Wilson Ross, announced yesterday as the new superintendent of high schools for the province by minister of education Dr. L. G. Dewar.

Mr. Ross was born at Union Head near Montserrat, and received his early education there and at Victoria Cross schools. He taught school for about a year after he had finished two years in Prince of Wales College, and then served for five years with the RCAF during the last war, being discharged in 1945 with the rank of Flying Officer.

After returning to PWC and continuing university in Mount Allison, he graduated with BSc and a BEd from the latter institution.

Appointment as provincial superintendent of schools came in 1961, work he continued for 10 years. A leave-of-absence in 1963-67 brought the chance to be teaching principal of a regional high school in Alberta.

In 1961 Mr. Ross was appointed to the staff of Summerside High School and in the following year he became principal of Central Queens Regional High, where he is still working.

Polish Author Dies

MOSCOW (AP)—Wanda Wasilewska, 59, Polish-born author who became prominent in Russia, died Wednesday, the Soviet news agency Tass said. She was married in 1943 to Soviet playwright Alexander Korotkiuk and that year wrote The Rainbow, the Stalin Prize novel for 1943.
