LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

GOOD FOR THE FARMERS—It is said that the good price paid to farmers for potatoes will hit a lot of mortgages in Aroostook county Maine, this year.

THE AXE AGAIN—On Saturday afternoon six employees of the railway were given notice of dismissal. James Murphy, the railway policeman, is among the number.

THE WEATHER—Winds increasing to gales from the east and north and becoming unsettled with rain settling in during the night. The gale promises to be severe and mariners would do well to be prepared.

PORK PRICES—In Montreal the demand for provisions is fair in small lots and the market is reported steady without any new feature of note. We quote:—Canadian pork, \$15 to \$16 per barrel; pure Canadian lard, in pails, at 7 1/2c to 8c, and compound refined at 5 1/2c to 5 3/4c per lb; hams, 12c to 14c; bacon, 12c to 13c per lb.

THE WEDDING WENT ON—A Windsor, N. S., despatch says: The pealing of wedding bells in the devastated town was a strange though joyous sound heard yesterday. The event was the marriage of Miss Florence Shand, and Dr. Bret Black, of Truro. The bride lost most of her trousseau in the fire but this did not stop the wedding.

SUDDEN DEATH—Very many persons in Charlottetown and elsewhere will hear with regret of the death of Mr. George Thorne, the well known butcher, which occurred this morning about eight o'clock. Mr. Thorne was in the city on Saturday, apparently in his usual health. In the evening he was attacked by the illness which terminated fatally this morning, notwithstanding all that could be done to save him. His mourning family have our sympathy.

LOTS OF POTATOES—Never has there been seen in Shediac so large a trade in potatoes. The streets of the town are literally blocked with wagon loads of potatoes. One can see groups of twenty to forty at the stores of Messrs. Tait, Hamilton, Melanson, Poirier and others. The farmers who have a good crop are now gathering in the money. The potatoes are selling at one dollar per barrel. There are some farmers in Barachois, Aboujagane and Gappele who will make a clean profit of \$600 alone. It is magnificent.—Monteur Acadian.

THE GLOUCESTER LOSSES—The Gloucester annual roll, giving the names of the fishermen who have lost their lives during the year ending September 30th, has been made up. The roll shows a loss of fifty-nine men and eleven vessels during the past year, against the loss of seventy-four men and thirteen vessels in 1896. The crew of the schooner Lizzie L. Greenleaf, numbering eighteen men, probably went down with their vessel, as they have never been heard of. The total value of the vessels lost was \$65,830.

RECEPTION ON SATURDAY—A social event of unusual interest was the reception at Bryn-mor on Saturday afternoon by Mrs. John Richards as a farewell to Miss Minnie J. Palmer prior to her marriage to Mr. C. C. Gardiner, on Wednesday morning next. The floral decorations at Bryn-mor were very pretty, those in the dining room being entirely of white chrysanthemums and maiden hair ferns most artistically arranged by Miss Fanny Longworth, Glynwood. One end of the large dining room was given up to the wedding presents, and it is not often that one sees such a complete union of good taste, usefulness, beauty and value as Miss Palmer's numerous friends and acquaintances have shown in their remembrances.—Guardian.

WORKING OF THE SPOILS SYSTEMS

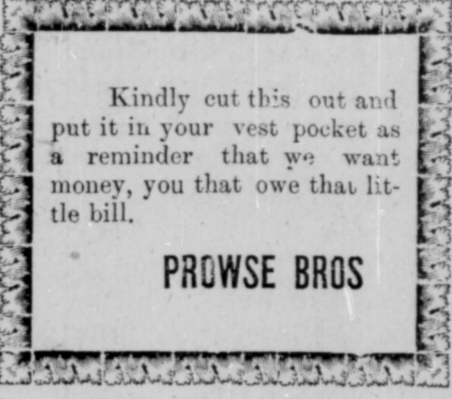
