MR. NORDHOFF, of the New York Herald staff, who has spent a week or more getting the facts of the fishery question, has gone to Cape Breton and will probably visit P. E. Island.

MR. SAMUEL HARRISON, of Moncton, while at work repairing the railway tank at Amherst on Tuesday had his right arm broken in two places by being crushed between falling timbers.

MR. W. R. WATSON, editor of the Good Templar of Canada, Toronto, who has been on the Island for several weeks past, leaves for home, via Freetown and Summerside, this afternoon.

JOE LANNON, formerly of Charlottetown, but now of Boston, has issued a challenge to fight any man in the world, barring Sullivan, eight rounds, Marquis of Queensbury rules, for a purse of \$500.

THE stallions Stockman and Island King, the first named owned by Jas. Clow, M. L. C., Murray Harbor, and the latter by Mr. Alex. McMillan, of Brackley Point Road, have been taken to the Bangor Exhibition.

MR. MAXWELL, Civil Engineer from New Brunswick, is here in the interests of a Water Works Company. The firm which he represents are now constructing water works in four adjoining cities in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

THE two Shetland Island ponies imported by Mr. J. J. Davies, of the Rankin, arrived here last evening via the Princess of Wales. They stand about three and a half feet high, are two and three years of age, and their combined weight is 499 lbs.

On Thursday evening, about a quarter to eight o'clock, a farmer was crossing the railway track on the Malpeque Road with a horse and mowing machine. The machine caught in the rails and before it could be released the express train came along. The horses were unharnessed, but the machine was a fixture until the cow-catcher came in contact with it, and moved it in sections into a field in the neighborhood.

HIS GRACE THE MOST REVEREND J. J. LYNCH, Archbishop of Toronto, was a passenger for the Eastern Express train this evening, for Baldwin's Road, where he will solemnly dedicate to St. Teresa to-morrow the beautiful new wooden Church just completed. His Grace will preach the sermon himself. The priests and people from the neighboring parishes will be in attendance. We congratulate the Parish of St. Teresa on the possession of one of the prettiest wooden places of worship on the Island.

It appears that, after all, Charlottetown is not the only place where the testimony given at Scott Act trials is peculiar. In a trial at St. Thomas, Ont., two witnesses swore that they had drunk bottled ale, which they bought at defendants store. One said it was "what is known as strong beer or ale," but he didn't know whether it was intoxicating or not. The other was equally ignorant as to its intoxicating properties, and said it did not intoxicate him. On this testimony the Magistrate dismissed the case.

McNutt; 172 do., shipped by Peake Bros. & Co.; 813 bags starch, shipped by Baltic Starch Co.; 300 do., shipped by Peake Bros. & Co.; 465 do., shipped by Prosser & Son's; 264 pieces birch timber, containing 5,619 cubic feet and 9,860 pieces deals and ends, containing 232,800 feet of superficial measurement, shipped by the owners, Peake Bros. & Co. This vessel will go on the berth at Liverpool for Charlottetown as advertised.

THE classes re-open at St. Dunstan's College on Wednesday next. Last year this Institution was in a most flourishing condition, there being on the tuition list as many students as the College could well accommodate. A large number of externs also attended the classes and lectures. This year a large number of applications have already been received from different parts of the Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec, and even the United States. The beautiful situation of the College and the excellent work done there offer an inducement rarely equalled. We are informed that the Rev. J. O'Ryan, of Laval University, takes charge of the class in philosophy this year. We wish St. Dunstan's continued prosperity.

Boston Excited.

BOSTON, Aug. 28. The mackerel market is somewhat excited owing to the high prices paid for two North Bay tons at Gloucester, Mass. On Monday last 700 barrels were sold by auction, realizing \$9.75 per barrel, sea packed, an advance of \$3.50 over last cargo sales. Receipts from the Provinces by steamer sold at \$9. Dealers have not had time to adjust their prices of small lots, but higher rates all around may be expected. The steamer Novelty's cargo of 80,000 fresh mackerel was disposed of at \$7 per 100. Dealers are almost out of desirable stock, and new arrivals of both salt and fresh are eagerly sought.

An Attempted Seizure.

BARRINGTON, N. S., Aug. 28. The Customs officials attempted to seize the Gloucester fishing schooner Legal Tender, for shipping men from here about three weeks ago. On boarding her it was found that the crew were getting under way, and the officials proceeded to seize. The captain refused to obey, and kept on his course with the officer on board. He remained on board till the schooner was some distance off the land, when he returned. The schooner left some of her crew behind, and if she calls for them she will certainly be seized.

Another Failure in Montreal.

MONTREAL, Aug. 28. Mercantile circles are agitated over the assignment of Gagnon & Froses, importers. Their direct liabilities are \$25,000 and their assets \$11,000. They assigned on the demand of the Bank of British North America. The failure was caused by forgeries.

Alexander, of Bulgaria.

LONDON, Aug. 28. Alexander, of Bulgaria, landed at several of the Russian provinces on Wednesday, and arrived at Lemberg, on return, on Wednesday. He received great ovations and will proceed to Breblan shortly.

Sir A. T. Galt's Appointment.

MONTREAL, Aug. 28. Sir A. T. Galt has been appointed the Chairman of the Royal Commission to consider the question of railway commissions.

Bribing Customs Officers.

MONTREAL, Aug. 28. The man Walters, charged with attempting to bribe Customs officers, has been committed for trial without bail.

MONTREAL, Aug. 28. Isacns, a cigar merchant, and Labelle, a confectioner, have left the city. Liabilities \$10,000.

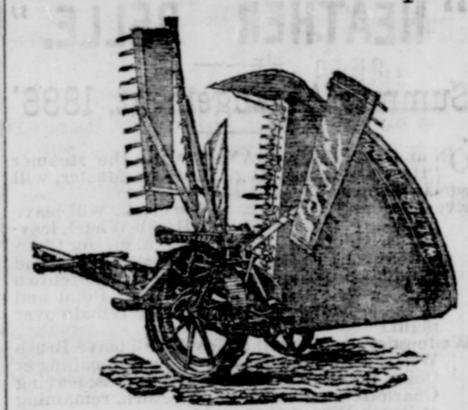
