## Contracts Awarded To Murray R. Firm

Solicitor-General J. Watson MacNaught, has made the announcement that the improvement at Prince George, near Edmund Bay, in the amount of \$58,919 has been let to the Murray R. firm of Norman N. MacLean.

The bid was the lowest of four submitted, the highest of which was \$74,039, tenders closed May 1, 1963.

The work, which is scheduled for completion in four months, includes the construction of steel sheet pile quay wall, 270 feet long. Dredging is also to be carried out in front of the wall, and the dredged material is to be placed behind the newly constructed wall.

In addition to O'Neill's death, at least one jail and lawyer were killed and many were injured.

Coroner Trahan, a sentenced judge, said the bomb was placed in suburban Westmount in his hands as he was trying to dismantle it.

## Revenue From Gas, Oil Increases In Alberta

By WALTER KRIVENCHUK EDMONTON (CP)—Revenue from a sale of petroleum and natural gas reservations, a major source of funds for the Alberta government, is running ahead of last year but a government official does not feel there will be a big increase.

Based on an \$8,202,000 sale April 25—the largest in two years—the provincial treasury received more than \$19,670,000 from a sale of petroleum and natural gas reservations to June 5.

With 1963 receipts running roughly \$7,500,000 ahead of the same period in 1962, indications are that a three-year downward trend in revenues will be reversed this year.

## MAJOR REVENUE

Revenues from the oil and gas industry have provided the major source of funds since the Leduc oil discovery in 1947.

In the 16 months to 1963 the government received \$1,304,679,000 from the industry—\$642,166,000 from crown-owned reserves; \$439,209,000 from rentals and \$223,307,000 from royalties.

Major attraction for oil companies this year has been the Swan Hills area, scene of Alberta's last major oil discovery. About \$2,500,000 has been paid for parcels in the area, 165 miles northwest of Edmonton.

The Kaybo area, 120 miles northwest of Edmonton, has brought about \$1,500,000 and the Sisseton-Lake area, a new intensive exploration centre just north of the Swan Hills field, has been good for about the same amount.

Receipts were 65 cattle, 76 calves, 13 hogs and 7 sheep and lambs.

Cows ranged from 10 - 16.50. A few common heifers brought 18. Good vealers were 22 - 28. Medium and common 10 - 18. Hog prices were not established.

Spring lambs were 35 - 39. Good sheep were 10 and a few common brought \$4.
