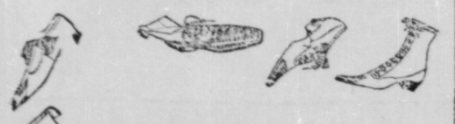

Y's ANNUAL MEETING.—The Y's will hold their annual meeting for the election of officers in their parlors, Grafon Street, on Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock. Every member and all young women interested are asked to be present.

PICTIC.—The annual Sabbath school picnic in connection with the Hazel Brook Baptist Church will be held on the grounds of Mr. Boswall Jenkins, Mount Albion, on Saturday, September 18th. Tea will be furnished to those without baskets for the small sum of 15 cents.

EXCURSION TO BOSTON.—Cheap excursion tickets will be issued to Boston and return, via SS Halifax, good for thirty days. The return rate will be \$11.00, including berth. The SS Halifax will continue leaving Charlottetown every Friday until close of navigation.

EXHIBITION NOTES.—We are pleased to learn that entries for the Provincial Exhibition are coming in rapidly. For the convenience of intending exhibitors the directors have, as in former years, opened an office in the Market building, upstairs, today to take entries. This office will be kept open till the end of the week.

\$100,000 INSURANCE DEAL.—Probably the largest policy ever written on any single life in Canada was placed last week by A. E. Donovan, the well known special man of the Mutual Life Insurance Co., of New York, on the life of a leading maritime province citizen. We understand the premium was in the neighborhood of \$3,000.—Halifax Herald.

HARPER'S WEEKLY.—Harper's Weekly during September will contain many features of particular interest, among them illustrated articles on the "Comedie Francaise," by Katherine de Forrester, on Kansas city as "A Great Grain and Cattle Market," on "The University of California," and on the two great new libraries in Chicago and at Columbia College, New York City. The Weekly of September 29 will be the "Sportsman's Number," and will contain 32 pages.

HARPER'S MAGAZINE.—Harper's Magazine for October will be particularly strong in fiction, containing the first instalment of "Spanish John," a story of adventure by William McLellan and continued instalment of "The Great Stone of Sardinia," by Frank R. Stockton, and of "The Keatuckians," by John Fox, jr., together with short stories by John Kendrick Bangs, George Hibbard, and Alice Brown. Among other interesting features there will be an article on "The Strategic Features of the Gulf of Mexico and the Caribbean, Sea," by Captain A. T. Mason.

HAS THREE WIVES.—A warrant has been issued in a sensational case. The defendant is J. W. Lane, who is accused of having no less than three wives. All three of his alleged wives have been subpoenaed to give evidence when the case comes up in the police court. The warrant has been placed in the hands of the chief of police for immediate execution. It was issued at the instance of wife No. 1, and charges the husband with cruelty to her children and desertion. Wife No. 1 was Miss Lizzie Hamilton. Lizzie Ryan is the name of the woman who, it is alleged is wife No. 2, and the third wife was Mrs. Tupper.—Halifax Mail.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening, Mayor Dawson presiding. Councillor Hughes was the only absentee.

After routine business a petition was read from a number of the residents of Ward 5, asking that a portion of Upper Queen Street be macadamized. A motion that the prayer of the petition be granted was voted down, and the matter was referred to the street committee.

Mayor Dawson intimated that only ten milk vendors had paid their license, the others refusing on the ground that their taxes last year were illegal and that those should be recony by the city before any further taxes were paid. The Recorder, whose opinion he had asked on the matter, inclined to the opinion that the milk-vendors cannot compel the city legally to return this money, but he was bound to say that the question was not free from doubt by any means. It is impossible to say which view the court might hold. Whether or not to risk a suit was a question for the Council to decide.

The City Collector was instructed to enforce the bye-law in question.

A letter was read from the policemen asking for one week's holiday during the year. The request was granted, Councillors Nicholson, McCarron and Taylor dissenting.

Mayor Dawson called the attention of the Council to the fact that the city has no authority to regulate the driving of vehicles on the Park Roadway. Councillor Nicholson gave notice that he would introduce a bye law for this purpose at next meeting.

Councillor McCarron moved seconded by Councillor Douse that the Stipendiary Magistrate be required to pay in all money collected by him for the violation of the Lord's Day Act. Carried.

Councillor Nicholson introduced the following resolution which was seconded by Councillor Douse,—

Resolved, That the council hereby authorize and instruct the City Marshal and police officers to lay information in the Police Court against all parties violating the Liquor Regulation Act.

After considerable discussion the resolution was unanimously adopted. Meeting adjourned sine die.

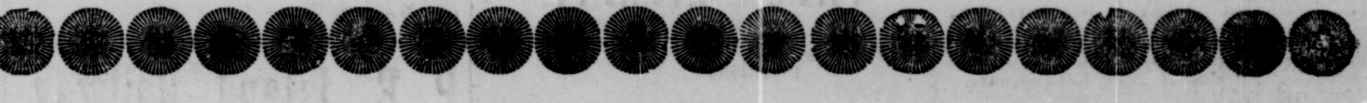
