Noted Island Preacher Observes 80th Birthday

Observing his 80th birthday today at his McGill Avenue home is Rev. A.D. MacKenzie, D.D., who during his 52-year colorful career in the Christian Ministry has served as missionary, evangelist, teacher and preacher throughout Canada and in British Guiana. A native son of Prince Edward Island, Dr. MacKenzie was born at Hartsville and after attending Prince of Wales College went to McGill University where he graduated in 1904 as gold medalist. He was awarded a fellowship to study at Glasgow University and after doing post graduate work in the United Kingdom had the degree of Doctor of Divinity conferred upon him by St. Andrew's College, Saskatoon, Saskatchewan. He was ordained in St. Andrew's Church, Sydney, N.S. in 1905.

Dr. MacKenzie's first assignment following his ordination was to the mission field of British Guiana. Five years of service in the tropics saw him contract malaria and yellow fever. These illnesses caused him to return to Canada. He accepted a call to St. Luke's church in Montreal. Following a very successful ministry in Canada's largest city, he became minister of St. John's church, Vancouver. A two-year term as a teacher at Stanstead United Church college in Quebec preceded a return to the west, this time as pastor of Westminster United Church, Regina. Dr. MacKenzie was 16 years in Westminster. In Western Canada, Dr. MacKenzie will be specifically remembered as the man who pioneered the radio ministry of the far north. This ministry which is appreciated by thousands in the isolated areas is continued to the present day.

LINGUIST OF NOTE

Strong in the tradition of the Scots, the veteran preacher is a master of the Gaelic and in predominately Scottish communities he often conducted his services in the Highland tongue. He mastered the Hindu language and can speak German fluently. Dr. MacKenzie's last three years in the active ministry were spent at Montague where as pastor of Trinity church, he was revered by all. MacKenzie Hall in Montague stands as a monument to his fine leadership. Although confined to his home, Dr. MacKenzie still evinces a keen interest in everyday affairs as he continues his ministry of prayer. His many friends wish him a continued and abiding happiness.

Milton Station Guernsey Is Awarded Gold Medal, Seal

Patosie Dairy Queen, a registered Guernsey cow bred by J. Eric Hurry, Winsloe, and now owned by Daniel MacLean, Milton Station, has been awarded a gold medal and seal for lifetime production. The award, made by the Canadian Guernsey Breeders' Association, was announced in the December issue of the association's journal. A 12-year-old, the Island Guernsey has completed a record of 97,017 pounds of milk containing 4,580 pounds of fat in nine lactations. Her last record completed in October was 11,369M-542F.

Ch'town Man Committed To Supreme Ct.

Maurice Hughes, 37, of Churchhill Avenue in Charlottetown, was committed for trial in the Supreme Court Monday morning when he appeared in Charlottetown Police Court before Magistrate K.M. Martin. The accused, charged with theft of the mails, elected trial by judge and jury. The preliminary hearing was completed Saturday and the case was adjourned to Monday morning for consideration.

Prior to his commitment Hughes told the Magistrate that on the night in question he picked up the first letter and called to Mr. MacDonald asking where the Meyer's Studio box was located. He said he was told it was in Division Four but he could not locate the box. He said he placed the letter in his pocket and would locate the box afterward as he had done on other occasions. The accused said he took the second letter addressed to Mail Film Service, which was a box in the 300s, to Mr. MacDonald who was working in the vicinity of the 300 boxes. He said he was told it should go in Meyer's Studio box which he located after a while.

"I had no intent to steal any letter and I did not leave the building," the accused said. In other cases on the docket a Southport man, 44, was sentenced to three days in jail when he appeared on a charge of being drunk and incapable. Failure to stop at a stop sign cost a Stewart Street resident a fine of \$3 and costs or two days.
