

**Canadian Produce for England.**

**When and How to Ship Apples Potatoes, Butter, &c., &c.**

**Compulsory Inspection of Butter an Imperative Necessity.**

(From the Halifax Evening Mail.)

Mr. George E. Forsyth, of Forsyth, Hart & Co., wholesale grocers, produce and commission merchants, of Hollis Street, recently returned from England, where he successfully and profitably disposed of a large quantity of apples, potatoes, butter, &c., &c. He was found in his office yesterday afternoon, when he consented to give the *Mail* his ideas of the most successful way to ship Nova Scotia fruit and produce to Europe, which will be of interest to thousands of our readers.

'Yes,' said Mr. Forsyth, in reply to our reporter's question, 'we have shipped a considerable quantity of produce to England this season. Our last shipment was made from Charlottetown in the steamer *Prince Edward*, and turned out successfully. I wanted a trip to Europe, and went over myself. My trip paid well, and I thoroughly enjoyed myself.'

Rep.—What did the last shipments consist of?

Mr. F.—Potatoes, Oats, Butter, and Sheep, shipped from P. E. Island, per S. S. *Prince Edward*; potatoes and apples, from Halifax, per brig *Annie Wharton*.

Rep.—In what part of the Province were the apples raised?

Mr. F.—Mostly in Kings County. They comprised Russets, Baldwins, Van deverso, and Rhode Island Greenings. A COMPARISON OF NOVA SCOTIA, ONTARIO AND AMERICAN FRUIT.

Rep.—How did they compare with apples from the Upper Provinces and the United States, when placed on the English market?

Mr. F.—I saw them opened side by side with Americans, and they were fully equal to them in quality and flavor, but they were not so nicely assorted. The Americans were better packed, and consequently looked better and looks go for a good deal in English as in other markets. The neatest looking article sells best, and brings the highest price, though the other may be its equal in every other respect. This little point is fully understood by our neighbors. The American and Ontario apples were put up in hardwood barrels similar to flour barrels; ours were packed in soft wood, and did not look nearly so well.

AN IMPORTANT POINT FOR APPLE PACKERS.

Rep.—Then you think our apples should be put up in hardwood barrels?

Mr. F.—Yes. Hardwood barrels are better. I should prefer them but I don't know that the barrels would make much difference if our apples were more carefully assorted and packed, and looked cleaner. I wish that point could be placed clearly before our apple growers. A medium sized apple is preferred in England. They don't object to large or small apples, but they won't give so much for them. What is wanted is that large apples be packed in barrels by themselves and branded; the same with medium and small, then dealers will know what they are selling and how to sell them, and people will know what they are buying, and prices will range accordingly. Where is now, in many instances, all sizes, are thrown into a barrel helter skelter, no one knows what he is getting; it is very unsatisfactory and the apples do not bring nearly as much as would be realized if they were properly assorted.

SHORT MEASURE.

Rep.—Was there any difference in the quantity of apples in the American, Upper Province or Nova Scotian barrels?

Mr. F.—Yes, and that is another important matter that our apple packers must look after, if they intend to make any headway in the English market. Both the Upper Province and American barrels hold nearly quarter a bushel more than ours do, and other things being equal, buyers naturally prefer barrels that contain the most apples.

THE KINDS THAT SELL BEST.

Rep.—What kinds sell best?

Mr. F.—There is not much difference in prices. If you ask which are most preferred I should say Ribston Pippins; Nonparels would come next, and Baldwins next. I do not know of any preference among the other kinds. If Greenings opened well and looked better than the average barrels of that brand do, they would sell better.

Rep.—Which do you think is the most profitable apple for shipment?

Mr. F.—I don't know that there is much difference, excepting Bishop Pippins. They are not profitable for export because they bruise and rot so easily, but the apple itself, if turned out in good order, sell as well as the others.

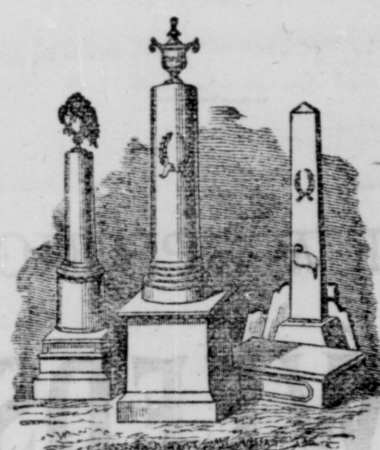
